






The basketball season of 1930-1931 was also well balanced. The team played 12 games in all and won half of them. The season started well with three victories and then fell into a slump which lasted until the Farmington game.


George Greenlee, stocky senior captain, proved to be a fine guide. Next year's team will be without the services of Cavell, Johnson and Captain Greenlee.

Dusenbury was the high point man of the season. He developed a very pretty corner shot.

The high point of the season was the defeat of Plymouth with a score of thirteen to fourteen.

Howard Beach, center of the team, was elected next year's captain.





#### FOOTBALL TEAM

The 1930 football season was as well balanced as one might hope for. The Orange and Black eleven under the direction of Coach Ruggles won two games, lost two and tied two.

Ted Cavell, senior captain, played quarterback in all of the games except two, after an injury received in the game with Belleville. He was good on the defense and was responsible for almost two hundred yards in gains. Cavell made famous the No. 3 spinner play which was the most effective plunge of the year.

Alex Johnson was the all-around man of the season. No matter what Alex was asked to do he responded without complaint. His passing and kick-ing were important factors of the offense.

Frank Hinchman was responsible for over a hundred and fifty yards in line plunges. He played at fullback part of the season for Alex Johnson and tossed the pass to Dusenbury that took the Dearborn game.

Fred Kerr at the end of the season developed into one of our best defense men. He intercepted three passes at Belleville and ran for a touchdown on one of them.

Wayne Preston spent three years on the team as guard. He was a good tackle and represented one of the strongest places on the line.


Ivan Ely developed into a fine center. He broke through the line for many fast tackles.  $\,$

Howard Christensen was the senior tackle. He had two years of grid experience.

#### BASEBALL TEAM

With the publishing of the Palladium the 1931 baseball season is just under way. As soon as the ground was firm enough for practice a large squad came out under Coach Ruggles and Captain Berendt. A game with Walled Lake was called off because of rain. Thus the team entered the league season without a practice game.

The games of the season thus far, follow:

April 24, Lincoln Park, there: Northville met a good team and was beaten two to one. Park had batteries of three years experience. Northville played a good game however. Only one hit was made from Johnson, the Northville pitcher, and he brought in the only run.

Dearborn, May 1, here: In the hands of a fast Dearborn pitcher Northville met a second defeat, this time the score being fourteen to two.






BOYS' TRACK TEAM

Lillian Cassie, whom we missed considerably on the team this year, displayed an excellent job as manager.


Our youngest star, Marilyn Cavell, acted as mascot. Her presence was always enthusiastically greeted.



#### GLEE CLUB DISTRICT CHAMPIONS






