





### CLASS HISTORY

As we look back over the four years of our high school education, we realize that many friends have been made, and much happiness has been ours.

When we mounted the steps for the first time to enter high school as freshmen, we elected as our class officers: Keene Bolton, President; Albert Boelens, Vice-President; Virginia Washburne, Secretary; Cecil Giles, Treasurer. Our first ventures in raising money for our trip to Washington were begun. Candy and bake sales were held frequently throughout the year. A carnival was given by all four grades in the gymnasium. The freshmen class was well represented by a sweet shop and a grab-bag.

With one year finished 55 students entered as sophomores the following September. At our first class meeting we chose Lois Chapman, President; Cecil Giles, Vice-President; Nancy McLouglin, Secretary; Alice Eaton, Treasurer.

Our Junior year was a notable one. It stands out more vividly in our minds than the two preceding years. The Junior play was given in the form of a variety show with two one act plays. The J-Hop was held in the school gymnasium April 2 and was an unusual success. The gym was transformed into a penthouse and the decorations were beautifully arranged. The class officers were: Cecil Giles, President; Albert Boelens, Vice-President; Keene Bolton, Treasurer; Margaret Garden, Secretary. We were guided by our class sponsors, Mr. Edwin L. Johnson and Mr. Elliot Barr. At the close of our Junior year our treasury held \$124.33 which was saved for our goal, a trip to Washington.

The Senior year went much faster and meant far more to the forty-nine remaining seniors than had those first three years. Our class officers were Martin Breitmeyer, President; Cecil Giles, Vice-President; Doris Tewksbury, Secretary; Walter Garchow, Treasurer. For our sponsors we chose Principal G. V. Harrison and Mrs. Ida B. Cooke to guide us through our last year of high school. The senior booth at the North-ville-Wayne County Fair proved to be our best money-making project bringing in a profit of \$343.49. To Mrs. Ida B. Cooke, who worked tirelessly in helping us in this venture, we owe a debt of gratitude.

Because of the experience gained in giving the J-Hop the Senior Prom was carried on more efficiently and economically, the profits showing \$56.26. April 1 was our last effort of importance, the class play, "The Importance of Being Earnest" was promoted under the direction of Miss Estelle Griffiths and Mr. E. C. Mollema.





### STUDENT COUNCIL HISTORY

At the time the new members took up the duties left to them by last year's Student Council, there was a debt of \$210.50. on the books. They began enthusiastically to sponsor all the major sports, the first being football. It happened that football came very close to paying for itself for the first time in several years.

At the beginning of the basketball season, the School Board voted to help the Council financially to the extent of \$125.00 to be used for current expenses. Without this help it is doubtful that the Council would have finished the year as well as it did.


### FOOTBALL HISTORY

### BASKETBALL HISTORY

The N.H.S. basketball team, headed by Captain Charles Bishop, won eight of the ten scheduled games this season. Probably the biggest surprise came with our unscheduled clash with Ferndale, a Class A school, when N.H.S. came out on top 49-18.

The most exciting games of the season probably were those played with Plymouth, N.H.S.' arch rivals. The two teams split the games, each winning on their home floor.

The team won the first game of the tournament at Ypsilanti 35-9, defeating Ypsi-Roosevelt, but lost the next night to Lincoln Consolidated 18-17.



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
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
