In September, 1937, the doors of N.B.S. were flung wide to welcome the new freshmen tribe about to start the first step toward a high-school career. The offlcers were; Frank Eaton, president; Louls Eaton, vice-president; Helen Dixon treasurer; Marilyn Cavell, secretary; and Mr. Smith and Mr. Ellison, sponsors. These officers led us through a paper-collecting campaign, a few bake-sales, and a hilarious party at the Farm Crest ranch house. Here, our tribe really showed their cave-man instinct. Then June, and school was out.

Some of our more ambitious squaws raked down nearly a tenth of a grand in U.S. wampum by selling a drink called ginger-ale at the local fair. Magazines were sold with some gusto by a few and we also had a hand in the N-clubls first Carnival. Mr . Lee deserves a great deal of credit for his dirocting of our class play "Applesauce." The real event of the year came in the form of our J-Hop which was a highly enjoyable project for all concerned.

Following the summer vacation we, with a few changes, returned for our last year in Northville High. We were decidedly more mature. There was much less confusion at class meetings and fewer carelessly prepared lessons. WE were "seniors," and we knewit. Our skipper this year has been Marilyn "Mac" Cavell and a mighty able one too. For first mate we chose Bill Widmaler who has also served as alderman. The log has been kept by Betty Stilwell, while Frank Eaton has cared for the ship's treasure chest. Because of splendid cooperation by the crew and the tireless help of Mrs. Cooke the grand sum of nearly $\$ 290$ was netted by our booth at the Northville Fair. Decorations were along the Mexican line for the Prom which proved an all round success. Among other activities that the seniors took part in were the following; selling Christmas cards, giving a dance, having a booth in the $N$-Club carnival, and selling candy.

Again Mr. Lee turned out a great play, "The Valley of Ghosts". Financially it was a record-breaking success, and three instead of the usual two performance three were given. And then came the time for our hopes to be rewarded and our fears to end; our departure for the nation's capital. Fifty-four of our class of sicty-eight spent five of the most memorable days of their lives on that trip. To Mr. and Mrs. Mollema and Mr. and Mrs. Ellison fo our complete thanks for the grand time they helped us have on the trip.

And soon now our long voyage will come to an end. The sea of fate has been kind, and the graduating class of 194I will remember that they spent four of their most interesting, exciting, and unforgettable years of their lives in Northville High School.
