On June 19, 1942, one more regiment of soldiers will join the ranks of graduates from the Northville High School Barracks. Behind this regiment there will be left but a battlefield of memories. Of these memories of high school days gone by, long to be cherished in the hearts of the members of the class of 142 , there are many.

On September 7, 1938, a fresh but frightened regiment of troops, llo strong, marched through the doors of N.H.S. Barracks. This freshman class, iike so many beforeit, had one main objective which must be conquered--graduation 4 years hence. After receiving their fighting implements consisting of books, pencils, etc., these troops set out on their great offensive. Leading this class into battie were; President-Harold Schoultz, Vice President-Laura Jean Litsenberger, Secretary-Dawn Sutton, Treasurer-Bob Stremich; Alderman to Student CouncilMyrna Hubbard, and lone sponsor, Mr. Wheeler. June 16, 1939, found this class bringing to a close their first major campaign with much success. During the course of this drive the troops had been entertained by the scphomore class in the annual Sophomore-Freshman party. The treasury boasted a total of $\$ 6.89$ which had been acquired by a collection from the members.

The following fall of 1939, the class once more stormed the barracks of N.H.S. During the summer, some of the veterans had been lost but new enlistees were soon to take their places. This Jear a new method of attack was planned. Shouting the cry of "Charge" were President-Maxine Coe, Vice President-Robert McCluskie, Secretary-Dick Simmons, Treasurer-Robert Stremich, and two sponsors, Miss Gladys Ludwig and Coach "Tex" Walker. Again taking the offensive the class of 142 plunged into battle. During this seige they entertained the Freshman Class and chose the rings which were to be symbolic of their regiment. At the close of this second advancement, these troops were feeling very proud and felt that victory was close at hand. They had the total amount of $\$ 55.98$ which had been gained through much hard work.

This regiment, hardened by their past experiences, rode into battle on the back of 1940. Their troops numbered eighty-five strong. They were now Juniors and this was the year that they were to begin earning hours toward their forthcoming journey to our Nation's Capitol which would take place on their last year in service. The first encounter they had with the task of earning money was at the Northville fair, where the feminine half of the regiment sold Vernors' gingerale. Their next enterprise was their Junior Play, "Life Begins at Sixteen." They were led by Mr. Charles Yahne. The spoils from this attack amounted to $\$ 106.37$. Now they were faced with the problem of the J-Hop. With the help of Frank Links' Orchestra, they were awarded with success and $\mathrm{F}_{\mathrm{B}} 89$. The magazine campaign netted a sum over $\$ 100$. They then participated in the Carnival. They got $\$ 6.75$ from that enterprise. Through this trying siege they were led by the very able officers; namely: President-Maxine Coe, Vice President-Robert Stremich, Secretary-Laura Jean Litsenberger, Treasurer-Myrna Hubbard, Alerman-Bob Vogtlin, and sponsors, Mr. Yahne and Miss Giltner.

The fall of ' 41 finally rolled around. Their first objective, was the semiar Booth at the fair. They came out of that victorious with the amount of $\$ 599.86$. In November came the Senior Rrom. Everyone fought hard to acquire the spoils to be gotten from such an offensive. They were aided by Jack Roseauer's orchestra. That same month they sold Christmas cards and made $\$ 358.35$. Another memorial battle was that of the Senior Play. It was written and directed by Mr. Yahne. This play was named "Summer Chills." Their profits on this amounted to $\$ 126.35$. Like other regiments before them, they sold candy at noons and at social events. They made the sum of $\$ 170.17$ on this enterprise. At last came the day when they were to leave for Washington D.C. This was their first furlough in the four lons year they had been in service. They had a wonderful time and even had $\$ 128.67$ left in their treasury. After they returned they started looking forward to graduation. This great event took place June 18, 1942, which will always stand out in the hearts of every Senior of 142 . It was preceded by Class Night and Baccalaureate. They were led through this great year by Mr. Charles Yahne and Miss Katheryn Giltner-Sponsors, Robert Stremich-President, Harold Schoultz-Vice President, Laure Jean Litsenberger-Secretary, Robert McCluskieTreasurer, Ray Hartner and Mary Hollis-Aldermen.
