## Senior Class History

In September 1939 a large excited grou of students gathered in the Northville High School Station, ready to board the four year express which would take them on the first lap of their eventful trip to graduation. Freshmen they were then, and only a little aware of the many great responsibilities called upon to take would arrive at their ultimate goal. Little were they worried, however, about these future tasks. They were beginning a wonderful and new experience and each one was sure of his ability to do his share in making tils trip one of the most profitable and enjoyable of his life.

There weren't many projects open to Freshmen so they spent most of the time between the first two stops, looking around at their fellow passengers and learning from them how best to conduct their activities when they reached the one-fourth mark or Sophomoreville. However, they turned out in force to the dance put on for them by the Sophomores and learned the particulars of class meetings from their sponsors.

Starting out the next year as Sophomores, and conscious of their added responsibilities, they proceeded to entertain the newest high school arrivals with the annual Freshmen-Sophomore party. They also collected coat-hangers, nettinc $\$ 10.50$, which not only added to the meager treasury but also gave them confidence in the success of any further class ventures. The latter included a booth at the NHClub carnival and a cay valentine dance; then almost before they were aware of it they had crossed the boarder of an important state and beca $=$ travelers in Junior Land.

They had been gaining momentum steadily and soon, through the presentation of a success ful Junior play, "Sprine Fever", and the sale of magazines, which both brought great profit to their class, they began to show what they could do.

The war has put aside their planned expedition to our Capital, but they realized that an increasing number of important causes created by the war could use the backing of an eager, patriotic group of "highschoolers". So they put on their colorful J-Hon with Bill Gail's Orchestra and agreed that profits gained from it and any future class projects should go to one of these causes, namely that of increasing the number of technical reference books necessary in the Iibrary for the new war courses which were to be introduced in the school during their last year. The remainder of the money was to be divided eione themselves in war stamps according to the number of hours of work each had contributed to the class.


Up to that time they had passed three important land marks and now they came upon the filtering sign pointing to Senior City.

Firmly resolved that they would make their last year their best, and one which would show their knowledge of the seriousness of the times, they entered the hitch school doors for the last lap of their trip.

Their biggest stop toward this resolve was the sale of ${ }^{4} 6,416.45$ in war stamps and bonds by their class alone.

Their Senior Prom came next in line and the class members again shoved their patriotic spirit by voting not to wear corsages unless they were made up of defense stamps. Going without this touch of decoration however didn't dampen their enthusiasm, for the prom was a huge success and the gym, decorated in a military motif was crowded to capacity.


Thus they came, up the steep climb of their high school years slowly, marking each cum of the wheels with some now knowledge gained and some new plea cure shared. And thus they $\mathrm{E}_{\mathrm{C}}$, leaving behind them the best they could give as an example to the next boarders of the Graduation Express.

We the Seniors of Nineteen IIundred and Forty-three realize this fact among the many lessons we have learned along ours way, that commencement is for us just what it says, not merely an ending of one phase of our education, but the starting point towards further learning and the beginning of new and Greater journeys into life.
