## SENIOR ANNALS

In September, 1940, six対 five air minded students took off for a tour of Northville High School, with little adea of what was in store for them, but their curiosity and ambition urged them on. Realizing that this tour was one of the most important in their lives, they vowed to be a faithful and loyal crew. Let's go back and review the rour major Flights in this mission and see what the class of " 44 ". has done.

Puzzled and uncertain, they started their basic training as Freshmen. Their new status was recornized early in the fall when the Sophomores entertained them at a party in the gym. The only school function in
 which they assumed actual responsibility was the $N$. Club Carnival, where they sponsored a penny pitchine booth. They did well in ti is Carnival and gained confidence in their ability. Many attel ded the Friday night dances for the first time. They experienced the loyalty of cheerinc the school team on to Victory.

In September, 1941, they took off on their second or Sophomore Flight. In the fall they realized their advanced
 rating when they became hosts to the Freshmen who replaced
 thera. In the sprine they learned tee meaning and real value of class cooperation by sponsorfrg a dance of their own. For such flying they were guided by their Sponsors Miss Lowe and lir. Pink. As June of their Sophomore year arrived they completed their under class training and commissioned Robert MacDonald as President, Carolvn Siclovan as Vice President, Thelma Trapp as Secretary, and Gladys Bedore as Treasurer for their first year of their upper class flycht.


Now they have reached the halfway mark, their basic training is over, and the tougher assignements becin. Before they entered their Junior Flight the war had becone much more serious, and they knew that many of their school plans and dreams would never be accomplished. Little did they realize that they would become war orphans, but they were determined to co ahead and do the best they could. In their Junior Flight they gave their Junior Play, "Special Delivery," which was fun and saved all the morey they could get. Today you can see the Plaque on the wall of the Senior Assemblys
it's a Plaque the class of "44" will always be proud of. They are continuing to add names of other boys who have left, and are hoping that when they leave Northville High School the Junior Class will continue where they left off.

The J-Hop of the Junior Flight was an exciting event for all of them. It was decided that the corsages would be made of War Stamps instead of flowers and everyone agreed. The night of the Hop, the gym was filled almost to capacity and with clever decoration and Max Gail's
 clever decoration and Max Gail
 memorable evering. Throughout the whole year they bought war bonds and stamps which they, as everyone else will continue to do until Victory is ours.

September, 1943, marked the beginning of their last flight. Everyone was eager for Graduation day to arrive although they regretted that so many of their members were called to help Uncle Sam, but they are proud of those boys and hope to see them all back soon. The main activity of this flight was the Senior Prom, trying there best to relleve the minds of the people from war, they all agreed on a Plantation Theme, with colorful decorations and Gene Fenby's excellent Orchestra they made another three point landing.

During the year they sold Potato Chips and Pretzels, adding to the treasury and this money will pay for more names on the Plaque which they started. Their War Bond and Stamp sales amounted to \$5137.75.

Now the tour of Northville High ends and each member of the crew will start on a new adventurous Flight into the world for himself. They will meet many tough situations but they will be able to overcome their difficulties and continue on the road to success.
