CLASS HISTORY

The class of 1946, which in our Freshman year included many students from Cady School, was introduced to N. H. S. by the Sophomore class, which entertained us with a party in the gym. Johnny Stark's orchestra furnished music for dancing, and refreshments were enjoyed.

When school opened in the fall of our Sophomore year we assumed our responsibilities as a class by first electing our officers: Keith Simons, President; Lois Taft, Vice-President; and Marilyn Goza, Secretary and Treasurer. Miss Lance and Mrs. Herrick were our sponsors. We started making plans for the party to welcome the Freshmen. We entertained them in the gym by dancing to records, playing games, and serving refreshment later in the evening. For the Eastern Star Ball we helped decorate the gym, took care of the check room and the boys formed a'clean-up committee to get things back in order. This added money to our treasury. In the Spring we selected our class rings.

In our Junior year we elected John Mahoney, President; Florence McCluskie, Vice-president; Keith Simons, Secretary; and Milan George, Treasurer. Miss Lance and Miss Burrell were our sponsors. We undertook the sale of magazines, earning over 2200. When Valentine's Day came we sponsored a dance at which every one wore red and white. Later came the big event we had all been waiting for, the J-Hop: Various committees were headed by Julia Lewis, John Schroder, Glenn Hardesty, Stella Poulos, Howard Walling, Linwood Snow, Joe Felber, and Bob McKeague. We used a Dutch theme, decorating the gym attractively with tulips and windmills. The music was furnished by Johnny Harberd's orchestra. At the commencement exercises of the class of 1945 we decorated and ushered.

Then came our big year: At last we were Seniors. This year we elected Milan George, President; Tom Gross, Vice-president; Ella Orr, Secretary, and June Bailey, Treasurer, with Mr. Mollema and Mr. Ellison as sponsors.

Our first big event was the Senior Prom. The committee chairmen were: Julia Lewis, Coralyn Stephens, Lester Ward, Clayton Graham, John Schroder, Irene Fox, and Lois Taft. Hoagy Carmichael's "Stardust" was the theme, the gym being decorated with stars and musical notes. Johnny Harbera's orchestra was again engaged. In January a group, under the direction of Mr. Yahne, began work on the Palladium. During the second semester the class members chose Keith Simons, Lee Bowring, and Elizabeth Mayer to take the examinations for the Pepsi Cola Scholarship Award. Florence McCluskie was chosen to receive the D. A. R. award. The class selected May 29 for the annual skip day.

Now we have reached the crossroads of our lives. Our high school days are over and the long road ahead of us will require courage and hope. No matter how discouraged we might become, we can always look back and remember that some of the best times we ever had were at Northville High.





Miss Lucht s homeroom has been busy this year with various activities including assembly programs, shopwork, home making projects and music and art appreciation.




N. H. S. PARTICIPATES IN WORLD FRIENDSHIP

In 1943 Miss Vickland's seventh grade English and Social Science classes, the present freshmen, sold \$100 worth of pencils for the China Relief Fund. The eighth graders, who are the present sophomores, contributed \$50 to the support of five of Madame Chian "Warphans", and the amount was doubled to support ten "Warphans" for one year. This was the beginning of our "Golden Rule" Policy.

Each student contributed to the Golden Rule Foundation to sup port the orphans of Europe. This winter Miss Vickland received a "Peace Bond" stating that her English Department and Homeroom had contributed \$120 for the support of the needy children of Europe, making the group a member of the Golden Rule Foundation for this year.

Surely these students deserve a commendation for their contributions, for they are doing their part in striving to win the good will of those who are less fortunate than we in America.

The Senior Student Council represents the entire student body in problems of school government, and has charge of the athletic program, school dances, assembly programs, and students on hall duty. Meetings are held once a month. The Student Council also endeavors to raise the standards of scholarship, to secure a greater co-operation between students and the faculty, and to create a spirit of greater loyalty to the High School.

For the offices of Mayor, Secretary and Treasurer, students are nominated each spring by an electoral college consisting of two members from each of the upper four grades. A meeting is held each month. Two of these meetings include the Annual trip to the Archeological Museum in Ann Arbor and the fall picnic.




