We sponsored, during the voyage, the Senior Prom choosing as a theme "China" and in the spring a musical was held. All through the voyage, we were busy preparing for the eventful trip through Graduation Strait; cards and announcements, measurements for full dress uniforms, preparation for class night and finally emergence from Graduation Strait into the Bay.

As we leave the Bay and set sail upon the vast Sea of Life, we want to bid farewell to our shipmates and wish them swift and happy sailing in the remaining years of their lives aboard ship. May you have many successful years guiding the seamen in the ship of school toward a robust and successful voyage on the Sea of Life.

In 1942 the Library Club was established under the direction of Miss Palmer to train students to work in the school library. The group attempts to become better acquainted with books and with library methods. The club is open to all students interested in books and in serving people.

Meetings are held Tuesdays and occasionally in the evening. At one of these meetings the club made bookends. Each year the club entertains the Farmington $\mathrm{Li}^{-}$ brary Club and in turn is entertained by them. The Mothers' Club has been most generous in giving money for subscriptions to book clubs.

There are 3500 books in the library now, including many recent and attractive volumes, Encyclopidias, Vocations, and Fiction. This year books on vocations were stressed. The Ladies' Board gave a generous gift for furniture to be purchased as soon as possible.

After defeating the Plymouth Rocks, the Mustangs brought home the Northville-Plymouth Victor's Basketball for the first time since 1943. In their next four engagements the Mustangs, due to their clear thinking, accurate passing, and good coordination, broke the fury of their opponents to win.
