## SEIIOR PROM



In 1945, the Forty-niners' wagontrain began its long journey, led by Jack Stovall, Joanne Bidwell, Jean Gray, and Clifford Schroder. We gained early friendships by being initiated by the Forty-eighters. The money earned at our hoedown was donated to the Public Address System.

We reached our Sophomore Station with Jack Stovall, Jeanne Freydl, Barbara Simpson, and Clifford Schroder taking the lead. We initiated the tenderfeet of our wagontrain with a treasure hunt. While in camp we participated in the annual carnival. Our contribution was a fortune telling booth. These profits also went towards the Public Address System.

Dick Kremkow, Lester Tomaszewski, Elizabeth Defina, and Hugh Niven took the lead after arriving at our Junior Station. Three months after our arrival we dug down deep and finally received our gold class rings. Along the way, we needed to add to the treasury a few more nuggets, so we started the project of selling magazines. In November we presented the play "We Shook the Family Tree", gaining more gold pieces to stage our J-Hop. We chose "Deep Purple" as our theme, with Jimmy Heffner's Orchestra furnishing the music.

The final miles of our journey were full of exciting events. We were led by Jack Heslip, Dick Kremkow, Barbara Simpson, and Yvonne North. Our sponsors were Miss Seeger and Mr. Yahne. In October we had our pictures taken and while waiting for them we presented our last formal dance, The Prom. We chose Eddie Casper's Orchestra to furnish the music and "Moonlight Serenade" for the theme. Arrangements for the Senior play began. We presented "Three To Get Married". We eagerly anticipated our long awaited journey's end. In May we took an interesting cruise to Niagara Falls. Other students hailed from towns all over the State of Michigan. We chose caps and gowns of gray with tassels of orange and black. Continuing on our way we received our diplomas after completing our long but joyous journey.


On the frosty evening of November 26 the gym of old N.H.S. echoed to the strains of "Moonlight Serenade", being played by Eddie Casper's orchestra.

The basic color scheme was soft blue silver and white. The moon silouetted music notes shone above the blue canopy extending over the orchestra. At the opposite end directly under the star studded invitation was the spotlighted life-size dancing couple, under a white arch. Trellises along the side representing music staffs held silver stars, black music notes and treble clefs.

The most successful highlighting event of this year's prom was the traditional grand march led by President Jack Heslip and Gail Matzen, Vice President Dick Kremkow and Joanne Bidwell, Secretary Barbara Simpson and Cliff Schroder and Treasurer Yvonne North and Bruce Butler.
