## Class History

We gave it on the 29 th of April with Ken Norman's orchestra providing the music. The theme was "Roses In The Rain." In June we decorated for the graduation exercises.
50. We were excited and enthusiastic in starting our last year. Roger Brummel was elected President Dick Stanley, Vice-President; Joyce Wick, Secretary; and Bud Cansfield, Treasurer. We chose Mr. Mollema and Mr. Menees as our sponsors. On November 25 th we held the Senior Prom. The theme was "Blue Moon." Al Rice's orchestra did the honors. We sponsored two dances after basketball game During the spring months we worked hard on our senior play, "Don't Take My Penny," which we gave on May 4th and 5th. For six delightful days we toured through Virginia and Washington, D.C., seeing all the interesting places in the capitol and Mount Vernon and enjoying a moonlight ride on the Potomac. For graduation exercises we chose gray caps and gowns with orange and black tassels. The traditional Baccalaureate and Commencement brought our high school careers to a close. Although we enjoyed these final ceremonies, they reminded us that we were leaving our school for the last time and we weren't altogether happy to be saying good-bye.
