



We German students feel very fortunate to have had the privilege of living in Northville for a year and of attending Northville High School. This year has meant a lot to us and the experiences we have had and the opinions we have won will not only be decisive for our lives and thinking, but likewise for a lot of other people in our schools, clubs and towns at home in Germany. By the kind help of the faculty, we have been able to visit: Michigan State College, University of Michigan, Lapeer, Northville Mental Hospital, Detroit schools, Football and Basketball games in Lansing and Ann Arbor, and the television station WWJ in Detroit. At this time, we want to give our deeply felt thanks to the teachers and students. Thank you for the wonderful way you have made us enjoy our time in the United States.

# CLASS HISTORY

Our story starts 'way back in September 1948, when a group of bashful kids elected Charles Ely, President; Wayne Hoffman, Vice-President; Peter Pletsch, Secretary and George Stalker, Treasurer. Was this a boys' class? Somehow we persuaded Miss Lance and Mr. Menees to help us survive the year. Great athletes of our freshman year were Leon Holman and Charlie Dickinson who helped to beat Plymouth in football, after thirteen years of losing. Who helped cheer them on? Pep Club members Judy Sechlin, Maxine Clark, Ila Baxter, and Janice Smith--of course! Class activities during the year included two dances, the one during the football season having some very unusual advertising. You would never have known Charles Lapham in the tent-size clown suit and the sandwich sign displaying 'The Green Frosh'! Bashful? Before the year was out many senior fellows were seen escorting freshman girls to formal dances and other social events.

In September 1949, with Leon Holman as our President; Mary Lou Litsenberger, Vice-President; David Lee, Secretary and Howard Meyer, Treasurer, we really started going places. Pretending to be actresses and actors, almost half of our class, along with other Drama Club members, helped to put on three one act plays. With Miss Panattoni in charge, they did very well. Skip Burkman managed the Varsity Basketball team while Bob Dayton tried his luck with the varsity football team. We had many important players on the teams that year. After much debate and discussion, we ordered our class rings in the spring. During the year we sponsored two successful dances, under the guidance of our sponsors, Mr. Jones and Mr. Burton.

Our Junior year began with a bang! Charles Ely, Don Maclean, Cece Bloom and Judy Sechlin, and our sponsors, Miss Lance and Mr. Mollema, led the way. Our first project was selling magazines. The competition was hard, since there were so many industrious salesmen. After pestering almost every citizen of the village, the class brought in \$1754, with Gail Matzen, earning the wrist watch for first place. We had three charter members of Miss Panattoni's recently organized debate team: Andrea Owen, Gail Matzen, and Marilyn Funk who in their first year of competitive debating went as far as the State Quarter Finals. Following this, tryouts were held for our play, "Mother Was A Freshman". Our stage was colorful and effective, and after two successful nights, the class profited \$200. We leaned back in relief--just one more jump ahead: the J-Hop. In the meantime, the N-Club was holding its annual initiation, with Howie Meyer leading the procession with green hair and wearing a stunning dress. We also sold Gobby hats and had great fun wearing them to basketball games. However, the teachers disagreed with our policy of wearing them in classes. The theme for our J-Hop was "Chinatown". For some reason, we weren't very industrious in planning the Hop and there was considerable scrambling at the last minute. One such ingenious idea was to simulate a waterfall with steam rising from a piece of dry ice. This did not materialize. Although our decorations weren't out of this world, Al Rice and his music was.

The final miles of our long journey were full of exciting events with Don Maclean, Fred Weihe, Gay Duerson, and Mary Lou Litsenberger leading our class under the sponsorship of Mr. Mollema and Mr. Smith. For our last year, our class was very fortunate to have four German exchange students, Ingrid Haenzel, Ingeborg Rothenpieler, Charles Wursching, and Ludwig Jagla, who participated in many of our activities. The exchange program was reciprocal. Dave Lee was our representative in Europe for four months. We started our year by posing for the photographers in October, receiving our pictures in November. Hollywood, here we come.... A big event in October was the homecoming game with our charming queen, Gay Duerson, and her attendants, Mary Lou Litsenberger and Maxine Clark. In December Senior girls sold Christmas cards making a nice little profit. Next came our sensational senior play "January Thaw", directed by Miss "Pan". On the last night one of those unforgettable parties was held at Gail Matzen's. On the evening of April 25, our gym was decorated to represent "The Lovliest Night of the Year". The seniors and their dates at the Prom danced to the music of a good Detroit Orchestra. For those band members at the dance the most important question was, "Will I get more than an Hour's sleep?", for the following morning, the band journeyed to Lansing to enter state competition. Our trip to Washington began May 10. It was very educational, as we took in everything from museums to a moonlight cruise. And then it came--our graduation. Baccalaurate was beautiful, Class Night was nonsensical as usual, and caps, gowns and diplomas provided the final climax.

In writing this final chapter of our history, we want our teachers, parents and the people of Northville to realize that we appreciate their instructions and patience. In the future we shall work hard in order to live up to the high standards you have helped us set for ourselves. Good luck to the undergraduates.

Well, there it was and none of us would have wanted to miss a minute of it, the fun or the hard work. We're leaving it to you, future classes of N. H. S.--do better if you can!


# STUDIO "X"
