

We were able to visit Michigan State College, the University of Michigan, high schools in Detroit, the Ford Motor Company, Northville State Hospital, the Wayne County Training School, Maybury Sanatorium, Traffic Court, and the Detroit Institute of Arts.

All this helped us to get acquainted with the American people, their ways of living and thinking, and their problems. We learned how democracy has grown in the United States and made her the strong nation she is today.

We want to thank the American people, especially our friends in Northville, for this chance of our lifetime. We believe that this opportunity will enable us to take part in promoting world understanding.






The Club usually prepares special exhibits for book week and holidays. They have also kept interesting exhibits in the bookcase in the lower hall.




