## class history

In September 1951 we began our high school career by electing Fresident John Funk, Vice President Paul Schulz, Secretary Adeana Gleason, and Treasurer John Clarke. To guide us along the way toward the Big Day in June 1955 we chose Mrs. Cooke and Mr. Peterson as sponsors. As Freshmen we learned how well respected we were by the rest of the school when we were allowed to gather firewood for the Snake Dance bonfire before the Plymouth game. Our first money-making project was a hayride and square dance in Bob Hannah's barn. We bought a popcorn machine and began the custom of selling popcorn after school and at the games. Remember the Sock Hop when the admission charge depended on the color of your eyes? A dance at the Scout Hall ended a happy and prosperous year.

The highlights of our Sophomore year were a successful pen and pencil sale and an outstanding bakesale. Remember how the German Band marched around town in the snow to advertise the bakesale? Who could forget that music!? After losing all the points of our Freshman year, we realized the importance of organizing a permanent record. A standing points committee was chosen. After the failure of one of our dances, due to lack of planning, we learned another lesson. Oh, the anxiety we had all year looking forward to the selection of our class rings in the spring! To guide us through this year we elected President Edward Mollema, Vice President Lynn Matzen, Secretary Mary Lovewell, and Treasurer John Clarke. Our sponsors were Miss Panattoni and Mr. Sherrard.

With President John Funk, Vice President Joe Girardin, Secretary Mary Lovewell, Treasurer Ed Mollema, and Mr. Stefanski and Mr. Sherrard as sponsors we started right in to work on our magazine sale, which brought us $\$ 558.29$. Suspense mounted as the school tried to guess the theme for our J-Hop. The theme, "Bell of the Ball," was still unknown after the Hop because Jerry Warren's orchestra had never heard of the music and thus didn't play it. We were certainly proud of our decorations, especially the big, mirrored ball that hung precariously from the ceiling. In the spring we presented the play, "Meet Me In St. Louis" directed by Mr. Skow. Some of the cast were all wet after the play--literally! Ambitious members of our class addressed envelopes for the race track. Remember the day we all turned up at the jewelry store, money clutched in grimy little paws, to get our class rings? Our representatives to Girls' State, Mary Lovewell, Gayle Ashburn, Leanna Doeksen, Priscilla Blackburn, and June King were happily surprised when they received that momentous phone call announcing their selection. Joel Soule, Dave Goss and Ed Mollema were our Boys' State representatives. To crown the year we initiated the Junior-Senior banquet. This preceded Class Night activities in the new Community Building, beautifully decorated by fresh spring flowers from local gardens. We also decorated for commencement. The student body elected Ed Mollema as 1954-1955 Mayor of the Student Council. The only sad note in our year was saying "goodbye" to our sponsor Mr. Sherrard, who left us after his third year of teaching in Northville.

At last! We reached our long awaited goal--our Senior Year. Mr. Mollema became our class sponsor along with Mr. Stefanski. John Funk became our President for the third time, ably assisted by Vice President Paul Hamlin, Secretary Paggy Hammond and Treasurer John Clarke. A new member of our class was Traute Schafer, our German exchange student. We loved having her with us and hope she enjoyed her stay in Northville. Marianne Ratliff was elected our Homecoming Queen, and her court included Carol Sutton, Peggy Hammond, and Janet Malott. The townspeople became well acquainted with us through our extensive sales campaigns this year. We rang door bells selling wrapping paper, Christmas wreathes (genuine holly), bracelets, and candy. Remember how cute Beevo Clarke looked parading through the halls with a holly wreath perched upon his dome? Just before Christmas we presented on the new stage with brand new sets and curtains, our Senior Play, "Goodbye My Fancy," directed by Miss Panattoni. The play was so successful that we were asked to give it at the Mental Hospital. That performance was hilarious, both from the actors' and the patients' point of view. Our Senior pictures came and we spent a week exchanging and admiring them. After Christmas vacation graduation loomed nearer and nearer. We chose the color of our caps and gowns, a beautiful soft blue-gray. If you listened you could hear, everywhere, excited talk about the Prom, May 13, featuring Bob Williams' Orchestra with 'Tara Theme" as our motif. The day after the Prom, Saturday, May 14, we left on our Senior trip. Remember that moonlight cruise, Skyline Drive, and the White House? One of the most interesting things was the changing of the guards at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier. After a whirlwind three-day jaunt in Washington we came back to our finals and graduation on June 9th. The Class of 1955 is now history. But we of the class will never forget N.H.S. In the words of our Senior Play,
"Goodbye, My Fancy. Farewell, dear mate, dear love. I'm going away. I know not where or to what fortune, or whether I may ever see you again--So, Goodbye, My Fancy."

The Class of 1955 would like to express their thanks and appreciation to parents, teachers, and all others who have given us their patience and help during our high school days. We hope that the undergarduates will have as fine a High School career as we have had.


## year in review

1985 is a long time away. 30 years! Will we be able to remember our Senior year at NHS? "Little things mean a lot." Here are a few little and not so little reminders that may help us to recall this wonderful year.

While aging Sir Winston Churchill was contemplating retiring as Prime Minister of England, Mendes-France, one of the numerous French premiers since World War Two, tried to encourage the Frenchmen to drink, of all things, milk! Solar energy began showing possibilities as a potential solution of the world fuel problem. But the thought of H -bomb or Cobalt bomb warfare was still a terrifying possibility. Russia's Malenkov was ousted and Bulganin was put in his place. In the U.S. the Supreme Court made a ruling that racial segregation in schools is unconstitutional. And Senator McCarthy's stock went down several points when his Army hearings were televised over the entire nation. The Nautilus, our first atomic submarine, was launched. An automobile output of $53 / 4$ million was forecast for 1955 . The big unions were thinking of proposing an annual wage. The uranium prospectors proved to be a 1955 counterpart of the Forty-niners' gold rush. "Soapy" Williams was the Governor of Michigan when construction began on the bridge across the Straits of Mackinac. In Nurthville Mayor Claude Ely and the councilmen once again brought up the question of making Northville a city.

In NHS itself the Homecoming events ended our football season in a new and exciting way. College Night at Farmington High School was a wonderful aid to our Juniors and Seniors. Although we didn't have many assemblies, the ones we did have were outstanding. (The hypnotist and the General Motors Exhibit.) The night the All-American Red Heads played the Northville Men's Team was an unforgettable one. The G.A.L. members participated in league play days throughout the year and the all league band had tryouts, rehearsals, and concerts. The Seniors had to have money for caps and gowns, announcements, name cards and trip payments all at once (so it seemed, anyway). Five students represented our school in a Junior United Nations Assembly at Hillsdale. The P.T.A. Carnival in May was a great success.

In motion pictures the new Cinerama, wide screen, 3D (with the little cardboard glasses), and stereophonic sound were attracing wide notice. "The Robe," "Carmen Jones," "Romeo and Juliet" (seen by the Sophomore class), "A Star is Born," and "Deep in My Heart" were movies which we can recall because each one has some outstanding significance. Marlon Brando was an academy award winner for his acting in "On The Waterfront." "The Country Girl" was the picture for which Grace Kelly won her academy award. " 20,000 Leagues Under The Sea" received an award for photography.

The boys all began to wear V-neck sweaters, flannel slacks, charcoal suits, pink shirts, argyles and saddleshoes. Then the girls came up with colored knee socks, short-short hair styles, the "Dior" look, long sleeve pull overs, long beads, sailor collars, middy blouses, man tailored shirts, and princess style dresses. Pizza and sloppy joes were the main nourishment on date nights. With Spring came Dairy Queens and ice cream bars. All year round nothing could beat the scrumptious baked goods we bought every noon hour down at Sally Bell Bakery. (Some of our figures changed during that time.)

What were some of the songs we enjoyed? "Let Me Go Lover" and "Melody of Love" were two that the romantic couples will never forget. Then there were

Of course, things start right here in school, too. Such as: "Old Sow," "Let's blow this vinegar pit," and "Let's cut out."

Maybe our parents have forgotten the main events of their Senior year, but we won't, will we? It's anyone's guess what these tidbits might sound like in 1985!
