In November you presented your play, "Mr. Barry's Etchings," a huge success and enjoyed by all. Again you had an outstanding and effective set. One of the most important events of your last year came just before Christmas vacation. Remember? Of course! The arrival of your Senior pictures and the mad scramble to exchange them with your classmates. You sold Northville pennants, desk pen sets, and Northville pins to help raise the funds for the much anticipated Senior trip. You set another precedent by sponsoring a "Christmas Ball," which turned out to be a successful dance due largely to the efforts of "Santa Johnston." Remember how you all gathered around the orchestra and sang Christmas carols? Excitement mounted as you realized how fast the year was going by and how clse you were to graduation. Your Senior Prom, with its "dreamy" decorations and music, turned out to be one of the niest Northville has ever seen. On May 175 h , you left for Washington. You elected Mrs. Black and Mr. Johnston as your sponsors and David Mosher, Jim Mosher, Ulinda Ely, and Larry Graham as your officers to guide you along the way. You sponsored two dances, one called "The Creep," which everyone was trying to learn, and the other, "The Snowball." You sponsored two bake sales, and in the spring you sold pen and pencil sets. The entertainment included pool, hypnotism, poker, dancing, and last, but not least, snipe hunting.

As Juniors, you began another very successful year with officers Ken Krezel, Donna Frisbie, Carolynn Burkman, Larry Graham and sponsors Miss Panattoni and Mr. Johnston leading the way.
