Remember what your first activity was? Ah yes, initiation! As Freshmen you had the questionable honor of gathering firewood for the snake dance bonfire. You sponsored a Sadie Hawkins dance in January, but after that things went into a decline. You ended your first year with the enormous sum of \$43.50 in your bank account.

In September of 1953, you came back feeling fit as a fiddle after a refreshing vacation. In your first class meeting you made a solemn vow to do better than in your Freshman year. You elected Mrs. Black and Mr. Johnston as your sponsors and David Mosher, Jim Mosher, Ulinda Ely, and Larry Graham as your officers to guide you along the way. Remember the terrific spirit behind your class that year? David Mosher and Jim Allen were your representatives to Boys' State in your Sophomore year. You sponsored two dances, one called "The Creep," which everyone was trying to learn, and the other, "The Snowball." You sponsored two bake sales, and in the spring you sold pen and pencil sets. On the sports scene: The Brooklyn Dodgers Astonished everyone (even themselves) by beating the Yankees decisively in the World Series.


The Spartans of M S U defeated U C L A in the Rose Bowl by virtue of a last minute field goal.






