





Administration

As administrators, Mr. Spear, Mr. Busard, and Miss Panattoni work together to make the Northville School System run smoothly. This in itself is a tremendous job, but this year they had an extra burden to contend with, the defeat of the millage. It was up to these people, with the help of the school board, to decide what programs had to be cut from our curriculum because of the lack of funds. Naturally, the extra-curricular activities were among the first cutbacks to be made. If it hadn't been for the Administrations' enthusiastic support of NPSD, these activities would never have been reinstated. Northville's administration was also confronted with the problem of the unsettled teacher contracts which delayed the opening of school for approximately two weeks. Mr. Holdsworth and Mr. Longridge work together to keep NHS running smoothly. This year the high school administration team has worked with our teachers to enact two new changes in the daily life of the Northville High students. One change is in the bell system, all classes now begin either on the hour or at fifteen to the hour. This change enables the student to have five minutes instead of four between classes. This system has worked extremely well because it has decreased the amount of tardiness considerably. The other change made this year is the elimination of sixth hour announcements. NHS students now have an announcement board in the main hall where all clubs put their notices for its members to read. This change has also been an improvement to the students and teachers, for no longer is valuable class time lost during sixth hour.

Material Center Updated With New Equipment

Because individual study is so important this year at NHS, the Instructional Material Center is the home base for students' work. The newly installed study carrells provide each student the opportunity to listen to the vast assortment of tapes and to view filmstrips. The tapes and filmstrips deal with such topics as crime, minority Groups, and interviews with some of our United States Senators. Finally, the filmstrips are improved! They are now not only in color, but have records that play while the filmstrip is being shown. Many students feel that with this improvement, they are much more interesting. Also, the library has received a large amount of new books and reference material. Many classes try to spend at least one class day a week in the library so that students can work on their individual projects. Besides the books, tapes, and films, the Instructional Material Center has an abundance of audio-visual equipment this year.







Math and Science Improve Programs

This year the Math Department is attempting to give each student an opportunity for greater understanding of mathematics by exercising their personal initiative. Mr. Benson said that through independent study each math student is able to delve fully into the problems of math he encounters as an individual. The student is also able to explore deeply into the concepts of math that fascinate him.

Enabling the math student to achieve his goal are programmed instruction, student aides, and team teaching. Each of these math instruction approaches is designed to increase the effectiveness of teaching subject matter that is very difficult for many students.

In "Independent Study" the student's interest and initiative are the two necessary keys to the door of mathematics achievement and appreciation.

Mr. David Johnson joined the math department this year. Last year he taught high school mathematics at Brighton High School. Mr. Johnson is a graduate of Northern Michigan University.

For the many students interested in science, Northville offers a comprehensive program of study aimed at the achievement level of all students. For students without great aptitude for science, a basic class in physical is offered. For the high achievement, college bound students, classes in advanced biology and physics are offered.

Students have shown their appreciation for the wide ranging science program by their increased use of new facilities installed late last year.

Individualized Approach Used in Socie

This year individual study has played a major role in the lives of Northville High School students. This type of study program allows each student to choose an elective and he may work at his own pace. "The success or failure of this program depends on the students" said Mr. Jones. The department offers such subjects as geography, economics, and world problems, in addition to the standard U.S. History, and American Government.

All students before graduation must take one year of U.S. History along with one semester of American Government. To fulfill the remaining requirements for Social Studies, students may elect geography, world history, or sociology.

Also, this year student involvement in classroom activities has increased. For instance, Mr. Skow's students in second hour American Government class are taking over some of the actual teaching. "I like to see students be involved in the class; not only is it a good experience for the students, but the students often become more involved when one of their fellow students is presenting something to the class", said Mr. Skow.

The teachers of the Social Studies Department are constantly working with the curriculum coordinator, Miss Panattoni, to achieve the ultimate goal of interesting and yet beneficial classes for the students.

Teaching the basic fundamentals of the business world is the main goal of the Business Education Department. This department has been designed for the budding secretaries and young businessmen. The Northville High School Business Department attempts to benefit all students; college-bound or job seekers. To give all students the best opportunity to succeed in business, NHS offers: personal typing, typing I and II, shorthand, office machines, bookkeeping, Co-op, and others. The Co-op program is in its second year of existance at NHS and gives students the opportunity to gain on-the-job experience. Those that are involved in Co-op spend the last hour of each day working at their job and learning about business from their employer. Mr. Sullivan is the only new face in our Business Education Department this year. He came to NHS as a replacement for Mrs. Osborn. Mr. Sullivan teaches typing and shorthand. He is a graduate of the University of Chicago and was formerly employed by the General Motors Corporation where he was involved in retail business. Mr. Sullivan has ten years of teaching experience. The metal and wood shops have been replaced with what Mr. Handy and the school feel is a more useful program for the students. Green Motors supplies cars for the classes on which they do body work. Also, students may work on their own cars. By working on their cars, the students learn the fundamentals of electricity, auto mechanics, and auto repair. Mr. Anderson heads up the drafting and mechanical drawing classes. This course is offered for four years to interested students. The activities consist of building model homes, drawing machine parts, and designing dies.



Hark! The Northville High School pool is completed. "The pool is used every period of the school day except fourth hour," reports Mr. Lauber. Both the boys and girls gym classes use the pool on an alternate basis with a few days for co-educational swimming. However, there are usually no more than thirty students in the pool at one time. There is a variety of instruction that is available now with the completion of the pool, such as: Red Cross life saving instruction, beginning and intermediate swimming lessons, and diving instruction. Besides these lessons, students learn how to play different water games such as water polo and water basketball.

At present, the use of the pool after school hours is very limited because of the lack of funds for extra curricular activities. However, private groups such as the Girl and Boy Scouts are allowed to rent the pool.



The Ski Club Has Its Ups and Downs





The entire 1968-69 football team deserves congratulations for such a fine season.




