The new superintendent of schools, Dr. George Bell, proposed a new plan for Northville High School this year. Included in the renovation of the high school is a change in the present grade structure and future facility use for the Institution Special Education Program. Dr. Bell said, "Instead of closing schools, we should be opening schools to part of the community which presently isn't being serviced by them."

Bell plans to change the present concept of K-6, 7-9, 10-12 to K-5, 6-8, 9-12, but not until the schools have been equipped to handle the needs of the other students, which would not be for another two or three years.












Boys' Swimming




Girls' Tennis








Track & Field Star








Bicyclist







In The News . . .

The year nineteen eighty-two was a year of economic despair and war throughout the world. The Middle East saw the continuation of the two year war between Iran and Iraq, the third year of occupation of Afghanistan by Soviet forces and the obliteration of Beiruit and invasion of Lebanon by Israeli "peace forces." Another hardship of the year was the world-wide oil glut. Nations that were previously accustomed to the seemingly endless flow of money from oil profits were faced with budget deficits and increased inflation rates. Saudi Arabia's leader of seven years, King Khalid, died and left the country to his younger brother, Prince Fahd.

In Western Europe, there was a growing sentiment of anti-Americanism and opposition to the deployment of U.S. missiles on European ground. President Reagan proposed to increase the number of missiles to compensate for the ever-growing nuclear arsenal of the Soviet Union. Sweden's coastline was once again violated by a submarine that was most probably of Soviet origin. Despite an extensive search conducted with sonar, submarine nets, air patrols, and even depth charges, the submarine managed to escape.

Eastern Europe saw the end of martial law in Poland, but only after the "emergency powers" of the military dictatorship were included in a new constitution. After nearly two decades of ironhand control over the world's largest superpower, Leonid llyich Brezhnev, age 75, died of heart disease. During Brezhnev's long reign, the standard of living for the Soviet people nearly

tripled. However, at the same time, he was responsible for crushing the revolt in Czechoslavakia in 1968 and invading the country of Afghanistan. Also during this time, the war arsenal of the Soviet Union grew at such a rate that their nuclear, naval, air and armed forces either matched or exceeded those of the U.S.

Declining European power was tested in the South Atlantic when Argentina invaded the Falkland Islands, a small protectorate of the once great British Empire. After the sinking of several British ships, the downing of 25% of Argentina's air force and almost one month of fighting on land, the British recaptured the islands and several thousand Argentine troops. Repercussions in Argentina resulted in a change in the military dictatorship and triple digit inflation. Closer to home, Mexico faced possible bankruptcy and with the election of President de la Madrid, began to restructure the financial system of the government. Domestically, the year nineteen eighty-two was one of economic hardship for many. Despite President Reagan's advice of "stay the couse," unemployment passed 10% and in Michigan soared to 17%. In other harder hit parts of the country unemployment was at 30% and higher. G.N.P. levels and factory output were at their lowest since the Great Depression.









Regardless of the economy, American ingenuity proved to be as strong as ever with fantastic developments in medicine and technology. The world's first man-made heart was successfully transplanted and promises to save thousands of lives in the future. A combination of computers and medicine resulted in a dramatic breakthrough that enabled a paralyzed person to walk via computer implants in the patient's brain. In the sciences, Princeton University achieved creating nuclear fusion. Different than the presently used nuclear fission, nuclear fusion obtains its power from deoterium, a form of hydrogen that is plentiful in the seas. Another advantage is that nuclear fusion results in short-lived radioactive debris that can be easily disposed of.


