



TO INFINITY AND BEYOND

o senior Elizabeth Hadley got a summer job. Big deal. It's not rocket science, right? Actually, it kind of was. "What I did was very unique," Hadley said, displaying her NASA notebook. "I wanted to develop my computer programming skills while reaching out to the community," she explained.

Hadley was one of seven students in the United States selected for an eight-week internship with the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. To complete her mission, Hadley traveled to the Glenn Research Center in Cleveland, Ohio over the summer and put her supersmarts to work.

Working alongside NASA scientists, Hadley developed more than 500 lines of code that will eventually lead to stronger space explorations. "I also worked on developing a mini Mars Rover," Hadley explained. "The rover has similar features to the real Mars Rover."

Hadley reached out to the community when students from all over the country were granted access to the virtual rover through the internet. "Students can understand the different techniques required to drive the Mars rover," she explained.

Hadley netted \$3,000 for her efforts at NASA, but more importantly, she said she helped improve future NASA missions for generations to come.








CREW UNVEILS SECRET STAIRS

"Most students are scared to use it at first, but at the same time, it is exciting, and they think it is a cool and different experience," senior Daniel Robinson said.

As part of Tech Crew, Rob inson said he's seen students' responses to the unfamiliar spiral staircase next to the auditorium stage.

Tech Crew builds sets and works backstage for theater productions, and they use the staircase often. "The staircase is really important because we can change and move lights on the catwalk," Robinson said. "All of the lights are moved around on a regular basis."

"For safety reasons, only one person can be on the stairs at a time," Robinson added. "And walking is a must. If you run, you will fall."


Although the spiral staircase is familiar to members of Tech Crew, Robinson said only a few students outside of the drama department know about the spiral staircase.


















Soon after the Mustangs regained possesion


"After playing in Europe, I learned what it takes to keep pace with the European game," Alashe said.







The coaches for both teams had their own techniques. "During soc-


cer, our coaches had us work on improving our ball work, but the cross country coaches made sure I got miles in to stay in shape," Sims said.

















"lan works very hard and deserved every honor that he earned this year," teammate Nicholas Mencotti explained.



































"The worst was memorizing it. I don't even memorize that many words in English," Jakubowksi added.



















Then I dropped the match


because it was burning my hand," she said.

"Then all of a sudden, the table was kind of on fire, and I went to blow it out. Then a test tube fell off the the lab table and broke," she said.



Klutchko and her father rescue turtles that have been neglected by their owners. "Most of the turtles we have come from families that did not know how to take care of them," she said.

Klutchko explained that the neglect can lead to pyramiding, which causes the tortoise's shells to become bumpy and start falling off. "Once they start pyramiding, it doesn't go away. They are stuck like that for as long as they live," she said.

When Moore first visited Klutchko's house, she said she was impressed. "Sam is amazing. She is absolutely the best one to take care of the turtles. She really knows a lot about them," she said.

"There are three different types of turtles. The terrapins live mainly in water, turtles live in both water and land, and tortoises lives on land," Klutchko explained.

Klutchko's Biology teacher, Kim Taylor-Papp, admires her student's work as well. "I think that it is absolutely phenomenal that a high school student would save turtles," she said.


The Klutchkos haved cared for 20 different species of turtles and currently have 60 in their habitat. But, Klutchko added, she's not done yet.



"It was actually pretty scary, and now everybody thinks I'm a bad driver," Jahania said while laughing. "Which I am."





According to Bartschat, Christoph's A.L.L. Stars has three goals: to support research, make treatment more comfortable and raise awareness about children with cancer. Now the organization raises money mainly by auctioning off donated products.

The success of the lemonade stand and the auctions grew until the Bartschats decided to make it an official organization.

"We've raised about \$80,000 so far," Bartschat said. "It all goes to the Children's Hospital of Michigan."

Though Bartschat completed his treatment, he still supports the program. "I plan to keep on doing this until I go to college," he said. "I think it's important to help people and make a difference."

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MEET THE ARTIST

The artwork featured on the cover, table of contents, title page and dividers was created by Florida artist Kelly Hennessey.

"I jumped at the chance to do something different with my art," Hennessey said of the project. "I currently do mostly painting and figured this would be a great opportunity to jump out of my comfort zone."

The artist explained how she created the original designs. "To keep the lines super clean and sharp, I decided to go with cut paper," she said. "Not only will you get extremely clean lines, but you will have sharp, clear color."

She said once she decided on the medium, she created a couple of quick sketches with hard shadows, then transferred the lines to the paper and cut them out carefully, edited them with a careful eye and then adhered them to the background. She added, "My main objective for this project was to allow the art to be enlarged or reduced and still stay sharp, clear and visually appealing.

Hennessey credits the yearbook editors for giving her such great direction. "I was given very clear, easy, and well drawn ideas that only had to be manipulated into paper for a dark yet fun effect," she said. "I enjoyed creating this yearbook art and look forward to many other challenging projects."

Hennessey studied visual communication, fine arts and illustration at Kendall College of Art and Design and has spent the past 20 years experimenting with her artwork. "I have pretty much tried just about every art medium out there," Hennessey said.

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MEANWHILE ...

It seems like the 2011 yearbook staff knew it wanted a comic book theme even before the 2010 book was finished. The problem was figuring out what to do with it. There are so many ways to go with that idea. What would it look like? What would it be called?

We decided pretty quickly on the stark black and white speech bubble artwork for the cover, which then meant we had to come up with one word to pull the whole idea together.

Meanwhile ... Everyone agreed immediately.

Staffers scoured the internet for images that would inspire them, sketches were made by Student Life Editor Lauren Colasanti and sent to Florida artist Kelly Hennessey (see page 309) to see how she would interpret their ideas. Her highly-stylized, high-contrast illustrations set the look, and we were off.

The book was designed using Adobe InDesign CS2. Other effects and retouching were done in Adobe Photoshop. Headline text is set in Badaboom, sequence and speech bubbles use Dave Gibbons, and stories and captions are Corbel.

Most photos were taken with Nikon D4o, Nikon Coolpix L5 and Canon PowerShot SD450 digital cameras. Additional photography was provided by Steve Fecht Photography, Prestige Photography, Visual Sports Network and Joe Carulli Studios.

The purchase price of the book is \$60, and publication is made possible through book sales, the sale of senior ads and limited ad sales.

All 1,685 copies of the 320-page, all-color, 9x12inch books were printed on gloss 8o# paper stock. The Vista custom embossed, Silktouch Black cover is wrapped on a 145-pt. cover board. The front endsheets were printed on VC o1 white.

The whole affair was stitched together using Smyth Sewn binding and printed by Herff Jones at its Kansas plant.










