INDICATIONS AND USAGE: ARIMIDEX is indicated for adjuvant treatment of postmenopausal women with hormone receptor positive early-stage breast cancer. ADVERSE REACTIONS: The most common side effects seen with ARIMIDEX vs tamoxifen in the early breast cancer study are hot flashes (35% vs 40%), joint problems (30% vs 24%), weakness (17% vs 16%), mood changes (17% vs 17%), pain (15% vs 14%), nausea and vomiting (11% vs 11%), and sore throat (12% vs 12%).
