The Elmira (N.Y.) Gazette has recently published some extracts from a paper printed in that village forty years ago. Among them are the following. Among them are the following, relating to Sam Patch, who made his last leap over the Genesee Falls, at Rochester, November 13, 1829

October 12, 1829.—Sam made a big leap from Biddle Stairway, at Niagara Falla. His success was announced in an extra, which appears in 12 fractic of October 24, and is as follows:


