THE FENIANS AND CANADA.

Our Canadian friends are destined to be kept in hot water, from a continued fear of a Fenian invasion. Again the cry has gone forth, that troops with ammunition are concentrating at some point on the frontier, preparatory to making a descent upon Her Majesty's dominions, and the result has been a general rising to arms, to repel the invaders. In every town, and village, throughout the whole country, the feeling is general in denunciation of the contemplated action of these "visitors", and summary justice will be dealt to them in the event of their capture.

Whether the Fenians will fulfill the contract as designed, is hard to determine, but that some movement has been made among them, that betokens a warlike spirit, is quite certain.

Dispatches from the east say, that prominent Fenians are leaving for the frontier to take command of the advance forces, and that among the large cities, organizations are being assembled; and money subscribed to defray expense of the munitions of war; also, that part of this material is being distributed on the Vermont border, and other portions in the vicinity of the Red River territory.

The Fenian bands that were in organization during the time of their first attempt to gain a footing upon Canadian soil, and those who have united since, have been steadfast in their determination to try thefeat again, and risk the consequences.

Along the frontier the inhabitants of both governments have intermingled to such an extent, that very many of the Canadians are of our own kin, and on the most intimate terms. If we have any real friends upon Canadian soil, they are of this class, and to permit of such unlawful, wanton raids upon them, would be ungenerous indeed, and it is to be hoped that whenever the attempt shall be made, our government will take decisive action to prevent any such outrage, and punish the instigators.


