PARIS BESIEGED.

Verily the rumors of war are uncertain. But a few weeks since, the Emperor of France, the greatest military power of Europe, marched forth with his army—the veterans of many a victory—to recover new laurels on the battle-field, and add new luster to the nation's glory. But alas, what a change! What a reverse to human expectations! Instead of victory, and a triumphal return, they are repulsed by the enemy on every hand; their legions besieged, broken and captured, and the enemy surrounding them in their last stand-point, with but one alternative, surrender or destruction.

Paris, the city of luxury and beauty, is at the mercy of her enemies. The oft quoted words, "See Paris and die," may now be sung appropriately by the uniformed throng within her walls, should the Prussians bombard the city.

It would now be well for Prussia to make some reasonable peace propositions, for to continue the war against the French, she would incur the enmity of the whole civilized world! She had ample satisfaction at Sedan, without seeking more blood by the destruction of Paris, and though entitled to some equivalent for her insulted dignity, she will not be permitted to appropriate French territory without a conflict with the other European powers.

EUROPEAN WAR NEWS.

Peace negotiations have failed, as the exorbitant conditions required by the Prussians will not be conceded to by the French. The latter are determined upon resistance at all hazards. Paris is perfectly isolated from the rest of the world; their only communication being by balloons. Several engagements have taken place outside of Paris, being generally favorable to the French, but without material results on either side. The Reds in Paris are said to be obtaining great power, and the provisional government is threatened, and war among themselves is feared. It is said that the Prussians have obtained at Sedan—

From Strasbourg it is reported that Ulrich has six weeks' provisions for the whole population, and has no idea of surrendering. On the 25th a severe engagement took place on the Orleans railway, 16 miles from Paris, between 10,000 Prussians and a smaller number of French; the latter were victorious, capturing 7,000 prisoners, two standards and a battery of steel cannon. The French armies now arraying are estimated as follows: Army of the north-east, at Lille, 75,000; army of the north-west, at Rouen, 30,000; army of the Seine, at Paris, 120,000; army of Lyons, 150,000; army of the south, at Versailles, 200,000. Further security has been made on the Forts about Paris, at the suggestion of an American officer. Letters by balloon from Paris state that she is strong in soldiers, and has sufficient supplies for the whole winter. Basine made an attempt to escape from Metz on the 23d, but was driven back. Since the above was in type intelligence comes of the surrender of Strasbourg, on the 26th.

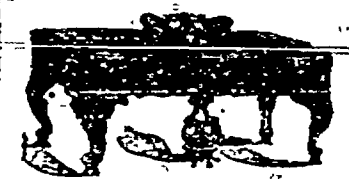
