HOLLY WAYNE & MGNROE RAIL-ROAD.

It is quite likely that our readers will expect from the above subject, that we are about to give them a glowing account of what has been done on this line, in regard to the \$100,000 to be raised in consideration of which the F. & P. M. were to complete the road. But such is not our purpose, for, notwithstanding that over four fifths of that amount has been subscribed, and the balance considered an easy conquest, so much so, that the general cry is, "The road is a sure thing now," there is by far the greater part of the work yet before us. When we take into consideration that it was far easier to raise the first \$20,000 than it is now to secure the one-hundredth part of it, we may, perhaps, realize that the road is not yet built. \$17,000 is about what is wanting, and where is it coming from? Who are going to secure the county for it? The men who have neglected their own business, and interests, day after day, taking their breath, brains and pocket, and enduring the snubs from this one, and that one, for soliciting their aid, have come to the point where forbearance ceases to be a virtue, and declare if the people want a road, they must come forward and help to build it.

What if your town has raised her portion. Unless the other towns make up, or have help to make up their amount, a rail road is just as far from us as ever. The whole amount must be raised, no matter where, or how. Let every person then see if it is not within his power to render still farther aid. Make another vigorous effort! This is our last chance. If we fail now, we might as well drop the rail-road question at once, and imagine ourselves—as strict adherents of sage-coach doctrine—as too slow for this age of the world.

We believe, with our Monroe friends, that the road will be a success, yet we bear to bring out our roster, until success is made sure, remembering that our neighbors of Ypsilanti failed to crow the "Air Line" into existence, and that



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
