HOLLY WAYNE AND MONROE RAILROAD.

A general sketch of its history. In the spring 1865, the "enabling act" for the Holly, Wayne and Monroe Railway Line was passed by the Legislature.

However much may be said as to the "incompetency" of management, stupidity of conception and selfishness of officers, one fact stands as a complete vindication of the foresight, financial acumen and enterprise of its friends.

It is said that "every reform has its martyrs." It is also true of this enterprise. Our town has the credit of its inauguration, and it is entitled to the credit of bearing a heavy (if not the heaviest) burden during these years of varied experiences.

It has been much easier to find fault, and to ridicule what were called FAILURES, than to struggle with an unwavering purpose, through sunshine and storm, against adverse circumstances, and what seemed to be almost fate.

Helping not to merit the displeasure of some gentlemen who have modestly labored, without compensation (to whose efforts, mainly, we are indebted for our grand success, at home and abroad, in private management, public councils, and sharp negotiations; we take the liberty to mention the names of Dr. J. M. Swift, who, it will be remembered, carried the bill through the legislature, and J. S. Lapham, the treasurer of the company.

Also, J. J. Thompson, F. R. Beal, Edward Simonds, Judge Yerkes, and W. P. Hargraves, who have been conspicuous. They have exhibited, not only patience and perseverance, but profound ability. We surely are not saying too much, when we remind our readers, that to them they owe a lasting debt of gratitude.

We would like to speak of effective workers at other points on the line. Our friends C. H. Beal and M. Conner of Plymouth, and J. L. Andrews of Milford need no mention here to make known their deeds. We would also gladly give a chapter on ANZAKA, (for such there are) who, while having a busy life, at the spirit that bears a burden proportionate to benefits received, but space forbids.

Finally, we accord to the people great credit for liberality and enterprise. This has promise of reward, in securing the only thing necessary to make the beautiful country tributary to the line of the road, among the most desirable, wealthy and intelligent in this, or any other state.
