HOLLEY-WAYNE & MONROE RAILROAD.

Only those experiencing them can appreciate the disadvantages of living in a village in the interior, without a railroad. Isolated and lost as it were to the outside world, with no mode of traveling except through the old fashioned and uncomfortable privileges afforded by a lumbering stagecoach at 10 cents per mile. Surely one could not be censured were he to exhibit symptoms of insanity as he views the smoke of the engine, and hears the shrill whistle of the locomotive, while far away the train goes to his home. To him seems more like the realization of a dream; the fulfillment of a prophecy wherein were doubt and imagination.

Many there are in our own town, who, a few years ago, would have had as much expectation of seeing King Solomon of old in our midst, as a railroad. Now, however, such a wished-for project is a sure thing, and, although not yet near enough to say it is here, still now that the road is finished within four-and-a-half miles of us, and such headway being made that the cars will be running daily trips from here within a month, there can be but little chance of a failure.

During the past week great exertions have been made to have the road finished so as to run the cars to the village.

Thursday 27th inst. The news spread over the whole surrounding country, and of course created intense excitement among the people flocking into the village from every quarter to gaze upon the phenomenon. Notwithstanding frequent and heavy showers of rain, the track was laid up to the village between 3 and 4 o'clock P.M., and amid great rejoicing an excursion train arrived from Wayne, consisting of 10 flat and two box cars, containing large numbers of men, women and children. A dinner, gotten up by the citizens of Plymouth was partaken of by the numerous track-layers, at the Court House. Speeches were called for, and responded to by different gentlemen connected with the road's interests, while the Wayne and Plymouth bands discoursed some excellent music for the occasion.

All to Plymouth! she has already broken loose from the barriers which have kept her so long in seclusion, and is now connected with the outer world by means of stories of iron, and will soon communicate with the principal cities by nerves of lightning.

The road from Plymouth here is rapidly nearing completion and by the 17th of the coming month (May) we will have cars running from this village. Then for a good time!

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
