THE LATE EDWARD LITTLE

A brief Biographical sketch.

With but few exceptions we all take our leave of this world and are soon forgotten. 2nd. our virtues and faults alike taking a final farewell. Friends may mourn for a brief time, and cherish for us a kindly remembrance, but they, too, soon pass to eternity, and become as completely obliterated from history as though they never had existed. Sad it seems this is nevertheless the fact, and it only becomes us to live and act in this vale of tears in such a manner that we can look forward to a life immortal in a world where sorrow is unknown, where friends can never depart or loved ones be forgotten.

Our paper to day presents an unusual appearance out of respect to the departed Edward Little as well as a last and fitting tribute of regard from us to the memory of a father.

For the benefit of those not versed in previous history we have copied the following lines:

Edward Little was born in Belfast, Ireland, in the month of October, 1812, being the youngest child of a family of seven sons and daughters. Until his 12th year he lived at home under the supervision of a mother and older sister; his father having died while he (Edward) was but a year or two old. What little education he possessed, was obtained from attendance on evening schools, being the only opportunity for learning afforded the poorer classes whose time during the day was devoted to labor. At about the age of 12 years he came under the notice of Lord Dugdale one of the most prominent of the Irish money-lenders and speculators of Cork, and residing at Lisnaske, a few miles out of Belfast. Here his day was light and to his liking, consisting in driving to the city and back daily for market, and his funds from the bank, such being the confidence reposed in him that frequently thousands of pounds sterling were intrusted to his care. About the time of his 18th year he commenced an apprenticeship of five years in the Belfast flouring mills, and it was while in the discharge of his duties there that he lost the fingers from his left hand. At the age of 31 years he married Rosetta Mankin, then 21 years old. Four years followed and then took passage with his family, on a sail vessel (steamship being then quite unknown) with some hundreds of others for America, sailing on the shores of the New world at Quebec, after a period of six weeks and three days on the water.

Finding Canada no place for a poor man, he moved with his family to Rochester, N. Y., and ultimately to Oswego, but soon emigrated to Illinois, passing a few years each in Elgin, Clinton and St. Charles. From the latter place his face was turned to Michigan, and the spring of 1855 found him to Northville, a village which, with the exception of three years in Milford, he made his permanent home.

Of his career here during the last 22 years, the citizens of Northville will know. He was always jovial and lively, sprightly and kind, and had a pleasant word for all. No anxiety for riches troubled him, nor did he desire to offend his fellow men, but wished only that he might live honestly and peacefully, enjoying life as he went.

For years past he was a regular attendant at the M. E. church, and although never fully uniting, still seemed to find pleasure in the teachings from the pulpit and class meeting exercises. The sincerity of faith manifested by him throughout his last moments, would seem to indicate that he was prepared for the final change.
