STATE OF MICHIGAN.

A Proclamation by the Governor.

WHEREAS, By the provisions of an act of Congress, approved on the second day of January, 1872, for the appointment of Representatives to Congress from the several States, according to the ninth census, the State of Michigan has become entitled to three additional Representatives;

And Whereas, The rapidly increasing population and growing interests of the different sections of the state such as to demand that a revision of the Commonwealth into Congressional districts conformatory to the provisions for increased representation, should be made before the next general election;

Now, Therefore, I, Henry P. Baldwin, Governor of the State of Michigan, by virtue of the power vested in me by the Constitution, do hereby direct that the Legislature of the State convene in extraordinary session at the Capitol, in the city of Lansing, on Wednesday, the 15th day of March next, at 10 o'clock noon, for the purpose of dividing the State into five Congressional districts, pursuant to the ratio of representation fixed by said act of Congress, and to consider and act upon all such matters as may be submitted by special message.

In testimony whereof, I have caused to set my hand, and caused to be affixed the great seal of the State, Done at Lansing, the tenth day of February, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-two.
