Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument.

The most tremendous gathering ever witnessed in the city of Detroit took place Tuesday, April 9th, on the occasion of the ceremonies attending the unveiling of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Monument.

The procession was grand in the extreme embracing every order, civic and military organization of the city, as well as many from different portions of the State.

The procession commenced moving at 2 o'clock P. M. the several divisions marching in the following order:—1st, the police; 2d, veteran soldiers; 3d, the Masonic fraternity, among which were over 1000 Knights Templar.

When the procession had taken the route designated and returned to the Campus Martius, the old chaplain of the Fifth Michigan Infantry, Rev. D. C. Jacobs, offered prayer, after which Governor Baldwin made the address of welcome.

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USEFUL AND SUGGESTIVE

It is said by very good authority that warm turpentine applied directly to the wound will work a speedy and permanent cure in most cases of lockjaw. Cold turpentine is also recommended as an application to recent cuts and bruises.

CARRIAGE LOUSE—The American agriculturist pronounces as the best remedy, lime, slacked dry with water, in which carbolic acid has been dissolved, in a quart, and dry air slaked lime three parts; mix together and sprinkle on the leaves, while wet with dew. Where they are very numerous on a leaf, it is better to remove it and destroy the insects by burning.

GRABAW GRASS—Take half-pint sweet milk, half-pint cold water; stir into it enough sifted Graham flour to form a batter thick for griddle cakes; stir well, and bake immediately. Drop into hot, oiled pans, and bake twenty minutes in a rather hot oven, dimming the heat toward the last. If preferred, they may be made all of milk or cold water, or the flour instead of Graham, or half of each.

To get rid of rats, a Iowa man comes them to parties of people in this manner: Spread a small piece of bread with molasses; cut in pieces three-fourths inch square, and put where your rats will get at it. Repeat this each night for a week, increasing the quantity each time. By this time all your rats are fully baited. Now take a good slice of bread and molasses and sprinkle it with arsenic, cut and put out as before. As soon as all is cut and rat takes his supper very quietly, and runs into the ground to die.

CLEAN SEEDS—Good seeds are of special importance. Be sure that all whether field, grass, vegetable or flower seeds are perfectly clean, and the best of their kind. If you have home-grown seeds, none should be sown except the produce of superior plants. In purchasing seeds, of course you must trust to the reputation of the purveyor. In fact, for instance, there is nothing so efficacious in keeping it from "burning to death," as sowing clean seed on clean land; and this instruction will apply to every other seed. Clean seed on clean land, give clean crops, especially if the after culture is good.

As soon as the frost is out of the ground the rough portion of the covering of the asparagus beds can be removed, and the other carefully forked in. Most of the covering of the beds is left in place, and also removed, and the first let run in a mulch. Flower borders, which are usually well covered with manure in the fall, can be treated in the same way, and the borders partially dressed. About mid April the rest can be tenderly forked in, especially where there are any bulbs remaining in the soil or tender roots, and the bed put in the best order.

Raspberry canes laid down through the winter can be relieved of their covering as soon now as the frost is out of the ground, and should be staked up at once. In staking they should be tied loosely to give the young branches room to grow and expand. Rose bushes not yet thinned out should be attended to at once. Rampant growers require sharp pruning. All stalks partially killed should be cut out to the ground. The best roses are produced from young or well pruned bushes.

Garberies should be generally well thinned out. Some of the spiraea grow tall and spindling, and fall over on every side, unless kept down. To have the finest snowballs there should be frequent plantings of young wood, as it is this that produces the large flowers.

The first crop of peas, Extra Early, should be sown as soon as the ground is, and followed by others according to directions given by the seed grower or two weeks. The onion crop is among the first to get in. The value of this vegetable is greatly underrated. None is more nutritious and wholesome, and should be in every household.

Rhubarb roots should be transplanted as soon as possible. Soil with horse-radish. This should be cut in pieces, each with a small particle of the crown adhering, and set two inches under the surface in a rich, moist spot. A box once established will keep itself going.

Grafting can now be proceeded with. Be careful in waxing or taping up entirely to exclude the water, otherwise your grafting will be fruitless. Let your out-door grapes lie on the ground until after they have begun to sprout, if you desire low-branched vines and new wood for renewing. *German-torn Telegraph.*

The Winter of 1871-2 in the North-West.

The following table gives the average temperature during the past winter (1871-2) at the points named. Except in two instances the figures are furnished by the thermometer at each place—morning, noon and evening:

The temperature at Helena, Montana, may properly be taken as a fair average for the Territory, and hence for the mountain section of the Northern Pacific Railroad, where climatic difficulties should be encountered if anywhere. Helena is on the general route of the Road, directly in the mountains, and but a few hundred feet below the highest point on the line. Notwithstanding the past winter has been the coldest ever known in Montana, and a surprise to the people, it will be observed.

1. That the average temperature at Helena (latitude 46°) for the five months was the same as that of Philadelphia, although the latter city is 4,500 feet lower, and 450 miles further south.

2. It was four degrees warmer at Helena than at Chicago, and only three degrees colder than at Washington.

3. During February and March it was much warmer at Helena than at Philadelphia, Louisville, St. Louis, or Washington. During March it was nine degrees warmer at Helena than at Washington and Baltimore.

4. The average winter temperature at Helena is 29.8°.

finished portion of the Northern Pacific Road (latitude 46°), was several degrees warmer than a Louisville, Washington, or Baltimore, in latitude 39°. The greatest cold of the past winter at Kalama was 14° above zero.

Letters from members of the Montana territorial government, dated March 6th, state that for three weeks previous to that time (beginning about the middle of February) the weather had been so mild that all signs of winter had disappeared; farmers had put in nearly all their spring grain crops, and new grass was three inches high in the valleys. The significance of this can be appreciated when it is remembered that in the Atlantic States, as late as March 23rd, intense cold weather and heavy snow prevailed; trains were blocked on many Eastern roads, and up to the 21st of April frost had not left the ground in Pennsylvania, and the grass had not shown the slightest tinge of green.

These climatic facts, mainly derived from official sources and easily verified, are the strongest possible corroboration of the statements hitherto made by the promoters of the Northern Pacific Railroad as to the climatic advantages of the valley for agriculture. *—The Territorialist, April 6th.*


