Gilmore's Jubilee.

Mr. Gilmore's great Peace Jubilee in Boston was opened on Monday, the 17th inst. So far it has been a great success. The attendance is very large, and the immense building, which will hold 100,000 persons, is well filled. The streets of the city are gaily decorated with flags and bunting. The Prussian band arrived in Boston on Monday morning last. The British Grenadier Band has also arrived. This is undoubtedly the grandest musical gathering that has ever been gotten up. May the grand harmonies and mighty cadences of its twenty thousand voices have a tranquilizing, elevating and peaceifying effect as they roll and reverberate over land and sea.

The Geneva Tribunal of Arbitration met on the 15th inst. The British agent moved for an adjournment for eight months. The Board do not appear willing to grant the request.

Wool.

There has been very little wool in this market so far. There is such a wide difference between the views of buyers and growers that sales are few. Prices range from 55 to 58c. For the most part, the wool is in expectation of higher prices. Whether this course is wise or not is a matter of conjecture. Many reports, however, show very little doing. California wool has hardly begun to move yet. Mr. L. G. N. Randolph, of this town, is doing an extensive business in wool buying.

James Gordon Bennett was buried on the 12th inst.

The Dominion Parliament has ratified the Treaty of Washington.

Twenty persons were bitten by mad dogs in Louisville on the 16th inst.

Congress adjourned sine die on Monday, the 10th inst.

The great Peace Jubilee in Boston, commenced on the 17th inst.

The National Suffering met in St. Louis last week. There was a very large attendance.

The murderer of Secretary of State Tyndale, of Illinois, has been discovered.

Eleven cars of a freight train, between Jersey City and Rahway, N. J., were thrown from the track by a misplaced switch. One killed and one fatally injured.

The Young Men's Christian Association closed its Seventeenth Annual Convention at Lowell, Mass., on the 14th inst.

A terrible accident occurred at McGregor, Iowa, on the 12th inst. The boiler of a train exploded, killing ten persons and wounding a large number.

The international four-oar boat race, between the English and American crews, resulted in the defeat of the latter by twenty lengths.

The Tenth Michigan Infantry are to hold a reunion at Port Huron on the 26th of August.

The annual meeting of the Michigan State Institute of the Baptist denomination, composed of clergymen, met in Lansing on the 1st July.

The Democratic State Convention, to choose delegates to Baltimore, has been called to meet in Lansing on July 2.

Monroe is to have a gathering of the veterans of the year of 1812 on the Fourth of July. Several hundred veterans are expected to be present.

The Grand Council of the Knights Templar of the State of Michigan met in annual convocation in Detroit on the 6th inst.

L. Hopkins, a farmer near Onondaga, shot to death last year a public enemy.

The Wayne County Medical Society held its annual meeting on Thursday, the 14th inst.

The Thirty-first Annual Convention of the Michigan Central Railroad, for the purpose of electing officers, was held in Detroit on the 12th inst.

The recent rain has done a large amount of good to the crops in the West.

Country Newspapers.
