To wash it clean without injuring it, you should stop charming as soon as the butter has come, and the buttermilk will separate readily. It is then in a losse, open mass, the particles being not much larger than wheat; and at this stage draw off the butterfolk into a dear wheat and at the stage of the stage. wheat; and at this stage draw off the butterfillk into a clean pail, so that if any particles of butter oscape, they may be skimmed off and put back again. Then prepare a pail of water, at the right temperature you wish to keep the butter, which is about sixty degrees in winter, and colder in sum-mer, and dash it over the butter with Adapter, without moving either hatter or churn, letting the water run ali through the butter and out of the churn; then step up the churn, put in fresh water enough to cover the but-ter, tempered as before, then give the thurn half a dezen motions dashing the whole mass together, and draw of the water. It may be regarded as well-nigh certain that a given amount of potash applied in the form of appropriate juxtures of sulphate, carbonate, silicate and chioride of potassium, will, generally speaking do more good than when applied in the form of either one of these compounds. But in wood ashes we find a mixture of these salts ready at hand; not the best mixture, perhaps, but one ready formed, and in this country, at least, very easily obtained.—Western Rural.
