During the year 1887 there were seven cases of diphtheria reported to the village health officer as occurring within the village limits. There were but four deaths among this number. This is a remarkable small per cent. of deaths from this dread disease and shows as three facts: first, that the disease has not assumed that malignant type it often does and is not so much to be feared; second, that it has been treated remarkably well by our physicians; third, that our resident physicians are competent to handle it and that we should have complete confidence in them.

Another year has rolled around and we present our readers with the aggregate of the amount of manufacturing put out by our different factories during the year that has just closed. It will be seen by these figures that all of the factories are growing steadily and that as years are added to their growth so is prosperity. It is a very gratifying fact with but one or two exceptions the business done by each factory is largely increased over the year '86 and the prospects are bright for all of them the ensuing year. In the first column of figures is the amount manufactured by each factory and in the last row of figures is the amount paid for wages.
