The value of dairy commissioner and a big reason why every state should have an honest, effectively administered dairy bureau, was illustrated very forcibly not long since in a large city in a state near Ohio. One day the commissioner raided every wagon on the streets, and took samples for the state chemist, and the next morning the milk supply of that city fell off one fourth. The result has been that good milk has been sold since, and the farmers have been enabled to furnish just so much more milk, an amount seemingly heretofore that had a very "cloudy" origin. While the appointment of a dairy commissioner seems inclined to favor class legislation, if coupled with food inspection and given adequate powers the office becomes one of great usefulness in protecting consumers against fraud, and ensuring a better quality of foods, and is warranted fully on the grounds alone of health.

The Many World reminds millers of the oft-proved fact that flour dust is a dangerously explosive material. Beware, says the editor, of lights thrust or carried into bins or rooms filled with dust-laden air. A week ago, he adds, "I was startled as well as amused on entering a friend's mill, to see the latest 'cub' going around with an uncovered light, doing some investigation on 'his own hook.' As he thrust the light into a very dusty place, which his boyish curiosity suggested to him to explore, he was whistling in that peculiar foghorn tone peculiar to and possible to nobody but a half-grown boy, the popular old tune 'I want to be an angel!' As his whistle rose, keen and triumphant above the whirr and rattle of the mill machinery, I almost expected to witness the answering of his whistled prayer by an explosion of dust that would at once convert him into the angel he professed to wish to be. Having put the foreman on his track, I felt safer to stay inside that building until my business was transacted. In how many cases is the wild, fresh, careless, aptured cub the real cause of 'mysterious' fires and explosions? He is often as dangerous as a dynamite bomb or a fire brand.



In addition to voting for presidential electors, state officers, congressmen and local officers this fall, the voters in Michigan have two other questions. One is an amendment to the constitution relative to circuit courts. It provides for the election of more than one circuit judge in the Detroit and Saginaw circuits, and authorizes boards of supervisors in Wayne, Saginaw and upper peninsula counties, to pay their judges such salary in addition to that fixed by the constitution as may be determined by such boards. The new general banking law to be submitted to people as Act No. 236 of the laws of 1887 being on page 242. Under our constitution no general change in the Michigan banking laws can be made except by consent of the people at the polls.

A medical officer of the health department was speaking recently about the danger that lurks in deceased bed clothes, a *Mail and Express* reporter.

"Take notice," he said, "of the fact that disease and death lurk in the very pillows and bolsters on which we lay our heads at night. It is easy to talk of down and feathers, but it is a fact. If they were cut open, these articles would be often found to be more or less stuffed with the most heterogeneous materials. Pillows, bolsters, and beds have been examined and found to contain pieces of filthy, coarse, black serge, apparently parts of soldiers' coat sleeves, pieces of dirty, greasy, silk dresses, old worsted braid from the borders of women's gowns, soiled linen rags and colored calico, and even nuts and walnut shells and pieces of ermine hair. The bedding in this case was bought new, we are assured, a few years ago of an expensive and respectable upholsterer. Moreover, a woman who was employed to do the stripping work of the trade informed the lady of the household that the process of stripping bedding with dirty rubbish and soap was very general, and that few beds or bolsters contain only the materials of which they are supposed to consist."
