John Young was fined \$37.50 last week by the U. S. court at Detroit, for selling cigars without a license. It appears that he had April 1st, made application for a renewal of his license, and it was not till July before he saw the deputy collector who made out a license for the year commencing May 1. Mr. Young paid \$2.40 therefor. It is very common for the business men to make out an application for a license and then wait for the collector to come around when they pay for the same, rather than send them money by mail. This is the first case of an arrest for a case of this kind and the people are very indignant over it. The fine was for the costs of the suit only. It is very plain to see that there was no intention on Mr. Young's part to defraud the government as he paid the full amount of license long before he knew anything about an arrest.—*Bellville Enterprise*.

The people in this section are in a state of uncertainty concerning news to the effect that Dr. Nathan C. Hall, the man whom a majority of the people of Oakland county believe murdered his wife in this place by poisoning, is now himself dead. That report caused considerable comment, but later developments have led people to disbelieve the report of his death, and to believe the whole thing a put up job on the part of Hall and his colleagues, for the purpose of giving the public into a belief that he is dead, so as to enable him to locate in some place where he is not personally known—as a quick, a murderer and a criminal. Another belief is that, if the foregoing is not the true phase of the case, that some vile and dark deed of murder has been committed by Hall and that to cover up his crime in addition to the above scheme—he and his pals have tried to create a belief in his death. The cause for this belief is that when Hall's coffin arrived at Livonia, there were not enough friends to take it off the train without calling for help, and it was expressly ordered from Chicago that the coffin should not be opened. Even his sister was not allowed to take the last farewell look. Some of Hall's relatives have their doubts as to the genuineness of the coffin's contents and rumor hath it that it's only another trick of his. There is talk of exhuming whatever it was that was buried in Dr. Hall's name, in order to clear up the mystery.—*Danbury Daily Citizen*.

When the Paine family recently left their home at Atlanta, to be treated at the small pox hospital, they left behind their pocket books, containing about \$25, to be disjointed but only one cent of the contents remained; at least the money is gone, and therefore no fears need be had against handling money thinking it to be some of the infected lacer. It is hinted that "perhaps" some evil disposed person entered the house through the window and carried away the wealth.—*Danbury Reporter*.

We heartily endorse the following from the *Portland Observatory*: "Some one has introduced a bill in the senate to pension retired judges of the Supreme Court on a pension of \$2,500 a year if they have served fifteen years on the bench. Such a measure ought to be throttled as soon as it shows its head. The supreme judges receive \$5,000 a year; and if after having served fifteen years they have not saved enough out of it to last them the balance of their lives, poor men who are working for a dollar a day and skipping along on almost nothing, ought not to be called upon to help pay it. If such a fool measure should ever be brought before the people to be voted upon, we guarantee we will do all in our power to defeat it; and we hope every working man will vote and work against it."
