A SAD ACCIDENT.

A Young Son of Pitt Johnson Killed by a Horse and His Leg Broken in Two Places.

What came near being a fatal accident occurred at W Pitt Johnson's, in Beadown, Saturday noon when two of Mr Johnson's boys, Arthur and Lawrence aged respectively thirteen and eight years, went out to the barn just back of the house with a pail of water for a horse which Pitt recently purchased. The animal is of a nervous disposition and the boys had been warned to lead her out for water instead of going inside of the stall as they had been doing with the other horses. They entered the stall, Arthur ahead, and the horse became frightened, either at the noise of the pail or one of the boys touched her blanket, and she commenced to kick in a frightful manner. Arthur, who was ahead, climbed onto the manger and commenced screaming for his father. Lawrence had been knocked under the horse's legs, his right leg broke in two places, scratched and bleeding, there he lay, and the now thoroughly frightened animal kicking in a maddening manner. Mr. Johnson hearing the noise ran for the stable and reached the door as the horse's heels came down just straddling the poor fellow and again the heels went in the air for a seeming fatal descent, but before they came down Mr. Johnson had snatched, with almost mercurious rapidity, the boy from his perilous position and at almost the same instant the horse's hoofs struck the place where he had just lain. Presence of mind on the father's part and not a seconds delay, alone prevented a fatal accident.

The little fellow was tenderly born to the house and Dr. Burgess quickly summoned. The doctor found the right limb had sustained a compound fracture below the knee besides being badly scratched and bruised. The little fellow bears his suffering like a hero and is doing as well as could be expected. The other boy was uninjured except that he received a severe shock from which he did not recover for several hours.

The boys say they had been watering the animal in this same manner for a number of days past while Mr. Johnson was in Detroit and it was very lucky the accident did not occur then.
