WLL BUILD A ONE-TRACK ROAD

Buffalo Man's Schome for Travel ing 150 Miles ha hour by Electricity.

Before long, onless pretent plans fallthrough, work will begin upon a Westorn New York railroad of novel and curious design. On this new road, ac cording to the plans of the projectors passangers will be whirled across the country at the rate of 150 miles an hour if necessary, carried high up in the air in long, slender cars driven along a single rail by electric power. This first of the elevated railways will run from Oak Orchard Harbor to Ba tayla, a distance of forty miles, according to the route laid out. Of this route the right of way for three and one half a iles has been secured. The inventor, priles has been secured. The inventor, Capt. Lina Beecher of Buffalo, says the Express, chims that the advantages of elevated roads are many. The cost of operation is cheaper, there are no dan-gerous grade crossings, snow and dust are equally out of the way, no grading ditching and teneing are necessary; and a high rare of speed can be maintained a high rate of speed can be maintained in city and country alike. According to the Beecher system, he says that the farmer orn plow, sow, reap and even pick truit under the line. It is proposed to make the elevated structure light and harrow, so as to occup, and little ground. The passenger cars are to be about fortraire, feet long and three and one-half feet wide, carrying factor passengers apiece. Those long three and one-lialf feet wide, carrying forty massengers apiece. These long and harrow, car's will encounter very little atmospheric resistence, says Capt. Beecher, and will cut the air like a bird. The mirance to the cars is at the side. The coaches are made on the birdycle principle, and it is stated that in motion they will bakence themselves on the center or traction wheel, while the safety or guide wheels at the side will new touch the guide rails, thus causing little friction. The cars are expected to round the sharpest curves at high speed with safety and climb the steepest grade with ease.
