DEATH OF TUBAL C. OWEN.

He Was a Well Known Vessel Owner—Mrs. W. I. Ely's Father.

Tubal C. Owen, formerly of Detroit, died at his home in this village at four o'clock Monday afternoon of general debility. Mr. Owen was a lawyer by profession, and practiced at Marine City for a number of years. Here he organized the Escanaba & Lake Michigan Transportation Co., some thirty years ago and has held the office of president of the company since that time. He resided in Detroit about twenty-three years ago, where he resided until last summer, when he removed with his family to Northville, the home of his only married daughter, Mrs. W. I. Ely. For about years he has been an invalid. Mr. Owen was born in Caledonia, N. Y., March 24, 1819. He was married in 1846 to Sarah B. Fitch of Marine City. Deceased was a member of the Tabernacle Methodist church of Detroit, and for many years was its Sunday school superintendent. Besides the widow he leaves two daughters, Miss Owen and Mrs. Ely, of this place. Charles Owen of Ely City is an only brother, and Dr. Orville W. Owen, of Shakspeare fame, of Detroit is a nephew. Mr. Owen was well known among the vessel men of the great lakes. He was a man of exceptional business ability, and was noted for his honesty and integrity. The funeral occurred from the late home yesterday morning, conducted by Rev. C. T. Allen, P. E., of Detroit. The remains accompanied by the relatives were taken to Detroit on the 10 o'clock train for interment in the family lot in Elmwood.

The Northville Ladies Library Association is about to close a successful year successful in as much as over two hundred thirty cards, representing nearly twice as many readers, have been in constant use. As the new year opens the officers are anxious to extend the usefulness of the library even beyond that of the past year. The books owned now number seventeen hundred, comprising standard works of history, literature, religion, biography, music and art, as well as the latest standard novels, and plays are being made by which new ones may be added in a few weeks. The departments of novels and childrens books are especially complete because reaching the greater number of readers, but the other departments furnish ample reading matter for these desiring a different class of books. The fee, one dollar a year, is not beyond anyone's purse when paid in installments of five cents a week. Nearly a hundred of the young people took advantage of this installment plan during the year and have had the use of the books at a cost of less than two cents a week. The plan is open to both old and young. Every card bought means one or two new volumes for the library and gives the purchaser access to the best of reading matter for one year. 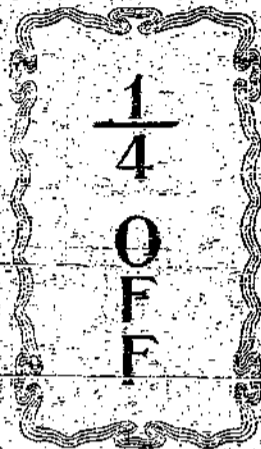

Mr. MacVeigh will be nominated by Representative Freeman M. Morris of Tipton, and the nomination will be seconded by Representatives Stoskopf, O'Donnell and others.

STORM IN THE SIERRAS.

Snow Banked Up Thirty Feet High Beside the Railroad Tracks.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Jan. 22.—Another storm is raging in the mountains, and although there is more snow on the ground than there has been for five years, it is rapidly growing deeper. The storm began yesterday morning and continued without ceasing all day. The wind is howling through the mountains, and the snow is falling thick and faster than at any time during the last twenty-four hours. Owing to the violence of the storm and the possibility of a tie-up at any moment, no more freight will be moved until the storm abates. Passenger trains will keep moving as long as possible. The snow is banked up alongside of the track in places nearly thirty feet, and the rotary plows are beginning to work with difficulty in these places. Hundreds of men are employed in shoveling the snow so as to widen the space between the banks. As it is now the snow scrapes the side of the cars, and as the plows can not work to advantage the shovelers work in tiers grading the lanes.

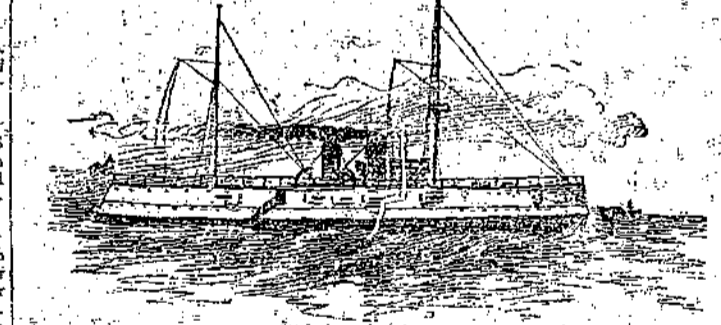

THE CIVIL WAR IN HAWAII.



THE UNITED STATES STEAMER PHILADELPHIA.

The steamer Philadelphia, just dispatched to Hawaii is one of the second-class cruisers of the navy, having counterparts in the San Francisco, Boston, Detroit, Maine and Minneapolis. She is probably the weakest of these, and during the civil war now in progress in the Sandwich Islands will not show up as well along side the first class cruisers of England which are there for business, as Americans would like. Admiral Walker, lately recalled from Honolulu, charged that English residents there were fostering rebellion against the republic and that the British warships in the harbor served as great encouragement to the rebels. He prophesied that as soon as our ships were withdrawn a civil war would begin. His prophecy seems to be fully realized. The mission of the Philadelphia is therefore a most important one. Rear Admiral Bearslee is in command. Though under instructions from the President he may use his own judgment after arriving at Honolulu.

The overthrow of the republic means that many Americans would be arrested, and perhaps beheaded for their part in establishing a government in Hawaii, similar to our own. On the other hand if he assists the republic in any way or offers protection to Americans engaged in the war, he will violate our treaty obligations with England, and other nations. There being no cable to Honolulu it will be two weeks before we will have any definite news from the scene of war. The latest advices came on Jan. 19 to the effect that 300 of the rebels were under arrest. There are said to be several hundred more bearing English arms and ammunition.

Yorktown. The second, under date of Jan. 21, says it is reported that Teng Chang Fu fifty miles north of Chefoo, had been bombarded by the Japanese, who had subsequently effected a landing on the Siang Tung promontory. This places the Japanese in a position between Peking on the west and the great fortress of Wei-Hai-Wei on the east. It is believed a movement will be made by land and sea upon the latter place, just as at Port Arthur.
