

That's the Way of the Rail Road Fares.

An important change will take place tomorrow in the matter of railroad tares which wilking measure affect all people, who semi-occasionally visit Detroit. The new single fare from Northville to Detroit will be 85 cents; round trip \$1.55-n raise of 10 cents on the former and 20 cents ou the latter. From Northville to Plymouth the late has been ruised trom-10 total cents and there is a charge of from one fo tour cents bethreen every station on the line.

The change is necessitated, and use been adopted by all railroads in the state, by a recent decision of the courts that radroads must charge just their charter rate and no more and in cousequence the old system of three cents per mile and adding enough to make the amount five on naught has been aboushed. 'the old fare to Detroit was originally made via Wayne and the Central, but under the new change will be figured by way of the Plymbuth route which is 281 miles.



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

What was Revolt-five years ago is Revolution now-revolution which has enguited thrones and principalities and powers; which has set up crownless, inhereditary kings and counselors of its own, and has bloodily torn them down again by dozens; which has raged and raged on unrestrainedly in fierce earnest, until but one king can still govern and control it for a little while. That King is named Terror, and seventeen hundred and ninety-four is the Year of his reign.

Monsfeur Lomaque, land-steward no longer, sits alone in an official-looking room in one of the official buildings of Paris. It is another July evening, as aline sat talking together on the bench overlooking the Seine. The window of the room is partly open, and a faint, pleasant breeze is beginning to flow through it now. Lomaque breaths un-easily, as it still copressed by the sultry midsummer heat; and there are signs of perplexity and trouble in his face as he dooks down absently now and then tito the street. The times he lives in are enough of
