THE BUSINESS MEN'S COMMITTEE ALREADY AT WORK.

Meeting Will Probably Be Held the First of August.

It is now almost a sure thing that the Wayne county teachers institute for 1897 will be held in Northville. The business men are going to take hold of the matter to the extent of subscribing a guarantee fund for the proper entertainment of the visitors and the committee is already working on a program in keeping with the occasion which will be announced later on.

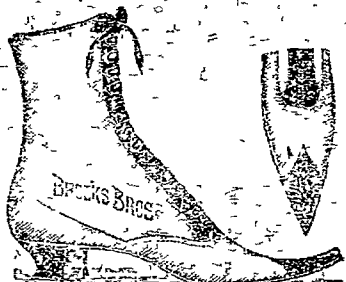
