ENGINE DERAILED

Will Clark Killed in a Montana Snow Drift Saturday.

FORMER NORTHVILLE BOY—HUSBAND OF ALICE BROWN.

Was an Engineer on the Northern Pacific Railway.

The Remains Were Brought Here for Burial Thursday.

The sad intelligence reached here Saturday of the sudden death of Will Clark at Kalispel, Mont. He was engineer on a Northern Pacific railway passenger train and his engine, the head of two which were hauling the train through a big snow drift, was derailed by a broken rail. The engine tipped over, resulting in Will's death, the two other occupants of the car escaping with serious injuries.

It is 20 years ago he was president of this town. He was a son of the late John Clark who lies buried in the Thayer cemetery.

Will is remembered here yet as a manly little boy. After working up on a farm he's for a time he resolved to go to railroading. He went to St. Paul and beginning at the bottom of the ladder by faithful persistent service he rose from yard switchman to the responsible position of engineer on a passenger train. He seemed to be pursued by an evil fate. In previous accidents he had several times seemed to be near being victimized. Some nine years ago he returned here and took back with him as his bride, Alice, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Brown of Novi, who with two children survive him.

The remains, accompanied by the bereaved wife and children, and a delegation of brother employees after several days of delay in Montana snow drifts, arrived here this morning and were interred in Rural Hill. The funeral was held from the home in Montana before leaving for Northville. The brief funeral service at the grave here was conducted by the Northville Masonic order.

Besides having accumulated considerable means Mr Clark carried a life insurance of some \$7,000.

MORE ABSURDITIES.

THE PLYMOUTH MAIL STILL PERSISTS IN THEM.

Says Northville Always Had the Best of Everything.

"Last week's Record devoted a whole column to enlivening the township board and calling The Mail editor a fool and a liar, which seem to be the only arguments they keep in stock at that end of the township. If the statements made by The Mail are untrue, all that is necessary is to prove it and every one will be retracted, if it cannot be proven false, why stand up and take your medicine like men."

Now the Mail will oblige very much if it will quote us correctly. The Record called the mail editor neither a "fool nor liar." by their affirmative vote upon every occasion. Not only this, but a number of the heavy tax-payers and representative people of Plymouth village say that in the matter of the two iron bridges, the Miller and the Sciole, the action of the board was entirely commendable and that the allegation of a "kick" from the south end was unwarranted.

The only thing that calls attention to the repairing of the old bridges is the fact that they all fell to pieces at once, and in regard to the \$6,000 or \$7,000 being spent on bridges in this end of the township the past year, we will say it was done by mutual consent and before the question of dividing the township was agitated, or it would not have been expended.

Again the Mail is not posted. More than the same amount of money has been used for new bridges in the township every season for a dozen or more years past than will be used this year as for the agitation of the division of the town to our knowledge was commenced, as many as eight years ago.

Neither The Record nor the township board can conscientiously deny that Northville has had the best of everything since the two precincts were established. A black man could see that with his eyes.

Again the Mail man manifests his ignorance. He has not lived long enough in the town. This last assertion is so absurd that any reply would appear ridiculous.

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
