FROM THE ANTIPODES

Government Fish Commr. of New Zealand Visits Northville.

THINKS IT THE BEST EQUIPPED PLANT IN UNITED STATES.

New Zealand People Well Advanced in the World's Progress.

L. F. Ayson, government commissioner of fish and fisheries of the province of New Zealand, is by order of his government making an official visit among the United States fish hatcheries, and was in Northville two days last week. His trip thus far has led him through several European countries, landing in the United States some twenty-one days ago. Northville was the third station he had thus far visited in this country and he had no hesitancy in saying that it was the most extensive and best equipped hatchery he had thus far had the pleasure of visiting.

Commissioner Ayson says in the matter of fish culture no country in the world has made such advancement, or has such extensive plants, as the United States. In speaking of Switzerland, Mr. Ayson says more fish are hatched at the Northville station in a single season than in that whole country.

Mr. Ayson says the activity in the way of fish culture by the New Zealand government is brought about by the gradual reduction in the price of wool and mutton, their chief exports, and the increased demand for fish in other markets, and at paying prices. He says the waters there are peculiarly adapted to the rapid and large growth of fish, some English brown trout being caught that weigh as much as twenty-five pounds.

In speaking of the development of his country he says that in the matter of farming and dairying his country is fully up to any he has seen or heard of here. They have all the new improved machinery such as harvesters, seeders, traction engines, double and triple furrow plows, railroads, electric lights, telegraph, and telephone, etc. The harvesters and mowers are nearly all bought in this country, but nearly all of the other machinery is the result of home manufacture.

He takes great pride in speaking of the remarkable advancement made by his country in the past few years. The people he says are decidedly democratic in their ways and remind him much of the people here.

Mr. Ayson is of Scotch descent, his parents being among the early settlers of the island. He is about 40 years old and his home is at Wellington, a city of 40,000 situated at the southern extremity of the northern island, being the seat of government. New Zealand is a British province and the government there is much the same as prevails in Canada.

Mr. Ayson is a particularly agreeable gentleman to meet and a pleasant talker. He has been connected with various fisheries for 15 years and is now being sent by his government to the high nearly every European and American country in quest of information that can be made beneficial to the fish industry of New Zealand and in his journey he will, before reaching home again, have traveled around the world.

FOR BETTER AND FOR WORSE.

THE DIVORCE AND MARRIAGE RACE A WARM ONE.

Were 1,656 Knots United in Michigan Last Year.

The total number of divorces reported by the county clerks for the year 1897 was 1,656. Of this number 423 were granted upon application of the husband, and 1,233 upon application of the wife.

The total number of children affected by the divorce of their parents during the year was 1,833 as follows: 711 of the couples had no children; 401 had one each, 199 had two; 127 had three, 52 had four, 35 had five; 10 had six; 13 had seven; 2 had eight; 2 had nine, 2 had 12, 28 unknown. The average duration of marriage until the granting of a divorce was 10.7 years. The principal causes alleged in the application for divorces were cruelty, desertion, non-support, drunkenness, adultery and imprisonment.

An analysis of the returns show that over one half (51.3 per cent) of all the divorces granted last year contain the allegation of "cruelty" as a factor, while about one third of all the divorces are granted on this allegation alone. About one-third of the total number of divorces involve desertion. These constitute the larger proportion of the suits of husbands than of wives. Next to cruelty, non-support is the most frequent cause of divorces granted to wives (11.5 per cent). No divorces are granted to husbands for this cause. Drunkenness enters as a factor into only 6.3 per cent of all cases.

In the counties of Alger, Baraga, Crawford, Gladwin, Iron, Manistowick, Montmorency, Oscoda and Roscommon no divorces were granted during the year. In Kent 155 were granted, while Wayne leads with 200, but as compared to population Kent is in the lead by far. Saginaw had 60 and Ingham 53.

HERMIT RICHARDS' ESTATE.

The Daughter in England Only Gets One-fifth.

An amicable settlement has at last been reached in the James Richards' estate, the hermit who was mysteriously murdered some two years ago. Four-fifths of the property, which consists of eighty acres and \$1,000 in cash, goes to the brother and sister of Richards, and the remaining fifth to his illegitimate daughter. Richards while in England so the story is told was a railroad contractor and made big money in constructing certain of the great English roads. Trouble with the mother of his illegitimate daughter drove him to America, where with a friend he continued his old occupation with much success. His friend returning home, Richards drifted aimlessly around and lost all connection with his family. During the winter Richards was murdered for his money, his family resolved to seek him out and become reconciled to him at any cost. The resolve came too late.

"Cruelty And Non-Support" In Michigan.

There are many conclusions to be drawn from the divorce record, says the Evening News, of the state of Michigan for the past year. Reformers have usually held that drunkenness was the cause of most of the unhappy homes, but out of 1,656 divorces less than 7 per cent were asked on the ground of intemperance. Over one-half of the applicants alleged the charge of cruelty, which is a term of the greatest latitude, and it usually rests upon bad language uttered in the heat of a domestic jar. Three-fourths of the divorces were granted upon the application of the wife. Either the men are less considerate of their duty to their wives than they should be, or the wives are too exacting.

It is rather startling to be confronted with the fact that the family ties and relations of 5,147 residents of Michigan are ruptured in a single year by decree of the divorce courts, but such is the case. Besides 4,312 husbands and wives who cast of the bonds of matrimony, there were 1,833 children concerned.

Kent county showed the greatest prevalence of domestic unhappiness. With a population of 122,000 there were 157 divorces, while Wayne with a population of 250,000 has but 290.

There are 25 divorce cases on the docket for the December term of Oakland county circuit court. By the looks of the marriage license lists from time to time the prospects are that the ratio will not diminish in the immediate future if the extreme youth of a majority of the contracting parties is any criterion. It looks as if there would be plenty of chance to "repent at leisure."

The Fowlerville Review is getting freaky. HER COPY.

REV. J. H. HERBENER ON CHRISTIAN SCIENCE LECTURE.

Claims Mrs. Knott's Talk Does Not Agree With Her Ms.

Editor Record: There is considerable disparity between the lecture of Mrs. Knott as published in your columns and as delivered on the platform of the Opera House Tuesday evening of last week. The printing was no doubt done from MS but there were many things in the lecture that are not in the report. As I had paper and pencil at hand and accurately took down many things that she said, I know whereof I speak. For example, in the lecture she indirectly accused preachers of not sticking to the word of God. Without taking the time to defend Christian ministers, will you kindly let me show you how close Mrs. Knott stuck to the Bible. An example of this, in itself not significant, except as it shows the manner in which Christian Scientists quote the scriptures upon which they pretend to base their faith, was her words: "As Jesus said, can any good thing come out of Nazareth?" As a fact, these words were not spoken by Jesus, but by Nathaniel and were given as his reason for not believing the assertion of Philip that he had found the Christ (John 1:45).

A more serious example of her many blunders was her assertion "Man is the image and likeness of God, according to the scriptures." The scriptures do not so assert, but that man was "created in God's image and likeness" (Gen. 1:26) and teach that sin has defaced that image to such an extent that he is no longer a good likeness, and assert that now "Christ is the image of God." (II Cor. 4:4 and Heb. 1:3).

Another example of her mistakes was "Man is not a material but a spiritual being." If she will read the 15th chapter of I Cor. she will see that Paul speaks of the body in which we now exist as a "natural body" and of the body we are to have after the resurrection as a "spiritual body." As a fact then, according to the scripture, man is now both a material and spiritual being. With a large array of errors like the above, it seems that Mrs. Knott lives in a house of glass and should be wise enough not to throw stones. It is possible also that Mrs. Eddy is not the inspired prophet that Mrs. Knott represented her to be, if it is true as Mrs. Knott asserted that Mrs. Eddy has issued the edict that no sermons should be preached. All the world knows that Jesus left as his final command "Go and preach the gospel to every creature." (Mark 16:15).

But it is impossible to point out and correct all her statements. I am told that when Christian Scientists have boils they call them "errors." Then I would recommend the study of II Kings 20:7. "And Isaiah said (to King Hezekiah who was sick) Take a lump of figs. And they took and laid it on the boil, and he recovered."

If Christian Scientists follow these Biblical directions in the treatment of their sins, they will soon produce a corner on the fig market.
