

Any person may upon making proper athdavits and depositing a sum of money with the town, county or state clerk have his name placed upon the caucus ballots of the party to which he belongs, for any office he may desire and those receiving the majority of votes at these caucus elections are declared the aerial navigation. He must be nominees of the party and their pretty fly names are then placed upon the election ballot the same as at present. It virtually means two elections The first to nominate and the second to elect. The greatest objection to such a system is that the cities would as a rule support the city candidates in the caucus election and the rural districts would receive little or no representation There is need of a reform in our caucus laws but we doubt not that a law along these proposed lines would do more harm than good If our law makers will pass a caucus law along the line of equal and proper ierresentation they will nave gone a long ways toward making our present primary law a very savisfactory one Either each township, or ward should enect its delegate or delegates direct to the farer. district or state convention or the district and county conventions should be required to give each gates elected at the primary.



INTERSTATE HOTEL

Wish to Make a Quick Trip from Illinois to Indiana,

The state line tavern in the northwest part of Hammond enjoys the pe-culiar distinction of bing half in Indiana and half in Illinois. The line that divides the two states at this point runs through the building, as shown in the accompanying cut. In 1882 the east section was erected by Mrs. Robert Werley and rented as a saloon. During 1892 the west section was added by her so as to extend over into Illinois about 25 feet. The second and third floors are used as a hotel. There are two entrances to the saloon on the

round floor, one from the state of Illmois, the other and front one from Indiana. . Plummer street runs in front of the tavern. The location of the structure with reference to the two states is such that the imaginary state line runs diagonally through the build-

ing.
This peculiar feature of the two states takern gives it a novel precedence not enjoyed by other places of its character. It is pointed out to, strangers as one of the sights of interest in Hammond. Not a few stor there while passing fjust to imbibe glass of beer and undergo the sensation incident to the novelty of the place. At one point in the siloon a person may stand in Illinois and drink a beer from the counter in Indiana This is done the counter in Indiana. This is done every day by hundreds with gusto and

Another feature of this bar is the arrangement of the slot machine These money swallowing devices are placed money swallowing devices are paced just over the Indana line, where there is no law to stop them. In Illinois they are under the ban and dare not be operated. To play them in Werley's bar, though, one has but to step out of Illinois into Indiana

Again, one who has broken the law of Illinois may seek immunity from the police by simply moving his lodging without inconvenience to his tavernand vice versa as to Indiana. In the hotel part of the building a number of the rooms are so arranged that a per son in beddies with part of his body in each state. And in the course of his toilet he crosses and recrosses the state line frequently For instance, he shares in Indiana and bathes his face and his bands in Illinats. Or vice versa Or where two sleep in the same bed, in two of the rooms one is in one state and the other in the other

Just west of the hotel is Mis Werley's garden. She raises vegetables and sells them in Indiana And so on ad libitum the incidents common to both states might be observed every day

An Incident of the Campaign of Guantanamo Bay.

The Singing of Spanish Bullets Rose Clear Above the Voice of the Chap-lain Who Was Conducting the Funeral Services

High on the riage where the marines pitched their tents on the shore of Guantanamo bay, the first Cuban soil taken by American troops, are the graves of the men who were killed in the first land fighting of our war with Spain. 

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
