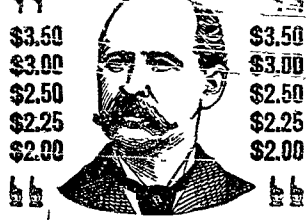

The discomfort of our predicament—up to the middle in mud and water, with the rain pouring down on us—was at the moment unfelt, in our excitement and eagerness in watching the enemy. Little Joe Storey, who was next to me, was trembling all over. Suddenly he gasped, his arm and whispering, "Oh, what shall I do? I must scream or fire off my rifle! I can't help it!"

But Storey was not a coward. He was a gallant little soul in action, and only his tortured nerves were responsible for this temporary revolt. "Then I told him to keep his eyes closed, and try to think of something else until the first shot fired. After that he might shout as loudly as he liked. I put one arm about his neck and drew him close to me. There, trembling, he rested like a quiet child. Presently his excitement wore off, and he became used to the situation. Then he was heartily ashamed of his breakdown."
