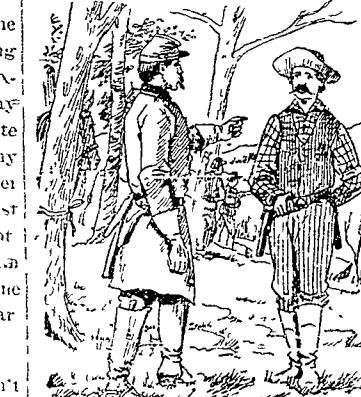
EASTER LILIES AND EASTER BELLS.
