

Washington, Dec 6-After an interesting debute of three hours the house Tuesday by a vote of 302 to 50 adopted the resolution offered by Mr. Tayler, of Ohio, for the appointment of a special committee to investigate the charges against Brigham H Roberts, the Mormon representative-elect from Utah. Previously the house had rejected a substitute resolution offered by Mr. Richardson, the leader of the minority. to allow Mr. Roberts to be sworn in and to send the whole case to the Judiciary committee. This substitute resolution, however, by no means come reached, the furl Democratic strength. Only lifty-seven members voted for it. Of the tanty who then voted against the Tayler resolution all were Demo-crats except two, Mr. Loud, a Cali-forma Republican, and Mr. Newlands, a silverite from Nevada. By the terms of the resolution Mr. Roberts is now not only excluded from all participa tion in the proceedings of the house until the countritie reports and the house passes thom his case, but he is deated a sear in the hall. 




