



# THE SCAB IS NOT

) make the title "hero" of any value it must be bestowed by some large part of the American public, but in the eyes of neither the laboring class nor the highly educated class is the scab a hero.

FROM THE STANDPOINT OF THE LABORING CLASS, THE GREAT MASS OF THE AMERICAN PEOPLE, THE TERM SCAB IS ONE OF DEEPEST REPROACH.

This class knows the scab through and through. While no class is more generous in its recognition of heroism, laboring men have never called the scab a hero. From earliest childhood it has been taught to despise and loathe him and to look upon him as taking away from the laboring man the chance of bettering his condition.

On the ground of motive, the scab's attitude cannot be justified in the eyes of the educated class. Scabs may be divided into the strike breakers and those who remain at work either through devotion to their employers, through necessity or from mercenary mo-

The strike breakers are purely the tools of the capitalist and gain their livelihood from the misfortunes of others? THEY HAVE BLEN CALLED MANY THINGS, BUT HEROES THEY ARE

The number of those who remain at work through devotion to their employers is pitifully small, and this fact shows that there is comething radically wrong with the relations between employer and

Now is to those who feel compelled to remain at work. The working nan's income is small, and he usually has a family dependent upon him and the question is, "How can I pay the rent and keep those dependent upon me from starving?" If any one deserves the title so thoughtlessly bestowed on the whole body of scale it is

The large-t seab class consists of those who remain at work from purely incremary motives. Scali seems a much more appropriate term to apply to them than here. To justify their admiration for him the friends of the scale have discovered that he is upholding the right of a citizen to work when he pleases, for whom he pleases and on what terms he pleases.

BUT WHAT IS HIS RIGHT? IT IS A LEGAL ONE, BUT IS IT A MORAL ONE? WILL PUBLIC OPINION UPHOLD A MAN WHO, WHILE ACTING STRICTLY WITHIN HIS LEGAL RICHTS, DOES AN ACT THAT IS SURE TO RESULT IN LASTING HATRED OF HIS FELLOW

All churches shall be draped in mourning for thirty days. Every day, for hine days, a requiem

mass shall; be celebrated in each church. On the day of Pope Leo's funeral

pontifical mass will be celebrated at the cathedral at 10.30 a.m. Solemn requiem mass will be offered in all the churches of the discess at an hour to be selected by the pastor.

Every evening for nine days, inclusive, the church bells will be tolled for fifteen minutes, beginning at 3 p. m. when the faithful are invited to recite the Rosary and De Profuncis for the deceased pontiff.

Catholics are asked to abstain from all worldly diversions and to visit the church and offer their communion for the repose of the soul of Pope Leo XIII




