





MURDERED BY A PERVERT

DETROIT CHILD VICTIM OF BLOOD THIRSTY FIEND.

LAD'S BODY HACKED AND CUT TO " PIECES.

MURDERER FAILED TO LEAVE THE SLIGHTEST CLUE.

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 19 .- A murder was committed in die city Monday night which for gruesomeness and brutality is almost without a parallel in the criminal history of the world, not excepting even the Whitechapel murders in London, England. 🧸 -

In the case of the latter crimes women were slain and mutilated, but the unimown pervert's victim in Detroit Monday was a poor, innocent lad of 41/2 years, Alphonse Welmes who a little after 2 o'clock in the after noon pressed a kiss upon his mother's lips and left his home at 244 St Aubin avenue, to pass the time in joyfub play with other beys of his age. - Nothing can be said of the bors movements after he left the parental domicile, but the discovery of his mutilated remains Tuesday morning tell of a most revolting story, almost too hor ible to refate. The little corpse was found by Edward Federle of the Michigan Stove works among a pile of molding boxes on the commons back and east of the stove works plant. The child's dark blue knee trousers were pulled down his red-striped shirt pulled up, the walst opened and his white undershirt cut from top to bottom and soaked with the little one's life blood.

Hacked to Preces.

A long piece of copper wire was tied around his right wrist so tightly as to cut-deep into the flesh. An old red handkerchief, a bandana, was forced down his threat so completely as to leave only a very small end exposed and to render it difficult to remove it

The lajuries inflicted, Lowever, were appailing Below the right breast and extending downward there was a cut eight and a half it ches long, made with a dull knife or like instrument, and penetrating deep enough to cut some of the intestines and the liver. It was deep enough to make the in erier organs protrude Another cut, three inches long, extended over an other vital part and served perhaps to disclose the preverted object of the inhuman flend. Part of the boy's flosh had been removed subjected to close scruting and placed upon the lad's right limb, while other parts were missing

On the left thigh there was an in cision, also made with a kuife, three quarters inches in length and two and a half frehes feen. On the back part of the upper portion of the limbs there were two more cats, the one on the right being seven inches long and two deep, while that on the left was carved, as though with demonincal delight, in a semi-circle, about eight inches in length, and fully three inchedeep. The left wrist was cut as to he nearly severed from the arm. There wero still diher lajuries.

There were abrasions and finger marks at the little one's throat. After all these injuries were inflicted and this had been extinct, the murderer completed-his work by twisting his vic tims head and breaking the neck





Washington, Sep. 1-The present opulation of Detroit, as ascertained the twelfth census, has been made public and Detroit's long anxious west is ended. The figures show that the city now has a population of 285 70-, as against 200,576 in 1590, and Tutherefore made a gain during the last ten years of 79,828, or on 77 per cent. As the population in 1886 was 116 349 the increase during the ten years from that time until 1890 was \$9,506,

or 56 96 per cent. According to the census of 1890, Detroit ranked fifteenth among the citnes of the United States, with a population of 203,370. One of the 15 cities was Brocklyn, Nan which is on-included in Greater New York. Washington, D. 





OR the second time in its history lie is preparing to march on San Francisco, the occasion be ing the thirty-seventh national encampment of the organization, which begins in the California metropolis on Aug 17. The previous visit of the civil war veterans to the Golden Gate was made in 1886.

For weeks San Francisco has been busy getting ready to welcome the old soldiers, and no expenditure of time or money has been spared to provide a reception worthy of the city and its distinguished guests. State and city authorities have joined to make the occasion memorable, more than \$100,-000 having been placed at the disposal M the various commettees of entertain

General Thomas J. Stewart, com mander in chief of the G. A R., predicts that the encompment will-be a success is every way, reports from department commanders indicating that fully 100 000 persons wall attend the reunion from points outside of California

From first to last there served in the Union army more than 2,000,000 fighting men. The line of battle was more than 2000 miles long, and from the first gun at Fort Sumter. April 12, 1861, to the surrender of Lee at Appo mattex, Apřil 9 1865, 2.260 battles and skirmishes were fought in thirty-four states and territories

In these four years of war 359.528 answered the last roll call and men answered the last roll call and 285 245 were discharged for physical disability. 
HELGOLAND'S GREAT LIGHT It is Said to Be the Most Powerful In
