NO CANDIDATES YET IN SIGHT

FOR THE ANNUAL VILLAGE ELECTION.

Caucuses Will Be Held Week After Next.

Notwithstanding the annual village election is only about three weeks distant scarcely a candidate for any of the offices has yet been mentioned. No issues are up and the prospects are there will be a shortage of candidates for any of the honorary places.

It is presumed that Mayor Johnson will allow his name to go before the people, and if he does his election is quite sure. Aldermen Stanley, Harmon and Phillips say they expect to retire again at this time from public life, but they are all too valuable men on the board to be allowed to have their own way in the matter. The opinion that all of them should be renominated and elected is apparently unanimous with the people of the village and it is doubtful if any other ticket will be put up.

Thos. Murdoch as clerk is one of the very best the village ever had and "he will have no opposition" is the opinion expressed by several well known taxpayers of the village to a Record representative this week.

Ralph Homeroy is serving his second term as village treasurer and therefore will not be eligible for reelection. This office is usually handled by one of the banks and the available timber seems to be L. A. Babblitt, D. H. Northrop and E. H. Lapham. Will Lanning will be a candidate for reelection as assessor, and as he has filled that office satisfactorily to the people he will without doubt be renominated. The office of assessor is the only real good paying office in the village and there are usually several aspirants for the job. However none besides Mr. Lanning have yet been spoken of.

The present council took hold when the village affairs were in a mixed condition with a bunch of extra and unknown debts of some thing like \$5,000 staring them in the face and to pay them it necessarily caused high taxes for two years. These debts are practically all cleaned up now and the village owes a great deal to the efficient and economical management of its affairs during the two years just about to close.

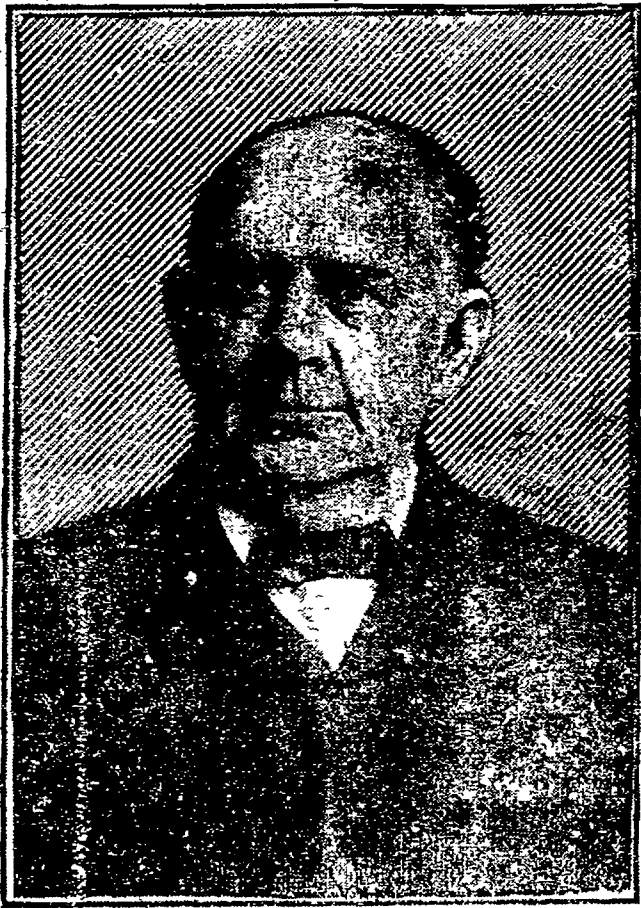

CALLED ON THE LORD

NELSON CREATED DRAMATIC SCENE WHEN CONVICTED.

EXCITING TIME IN BATTLE CREEK COURT ROOM.

HE AND FOLLOWERS SENT TO JAIL FOR 30 DAYS.

Battle Creek, Mich., Feb. 18.—The jury trial of Hedge T. Nelson, O. T. Hudlund and wife and Lundberg, was finished in Justice Bidwell's court last evening. The jury of six prominent business men were out one minute before returning a verdict of guilty of disturbing the peace. Nelson was required to furnish \$300 bonds to keep the peace for six months. The women was released.

The announcement of the verdict created a dramatic scene in the courtroom and his followers called upon the lord to send us upon the judge, the prosecutor the officers and attorneys of unwise adventures. The streets were full of Deputy Sheriff Angus and his officers to carry the prisoners out of the court to jail for 30 days and a fight all night ensued.

Nelson called upon the Holy Spirit to damn the devils, saying God will soon throw open the prison doors and we will be directed to go to the convents, laboring and tell the un saved the true light. The end of the world is only two years ahead. I could not furnish bonds for the sum of two cents.

Nelson appeared as his own attorney and pleaded his own case, at times breaking into tears. The defendants are glad he and his followers are in jail. An application is to be made to have all four placed in the Kalamazoo asylum. Wild utterances characterized Nelson's defense. The crowd at one time threatened him with violence, the court seeming powerless to stop his mad talk.

SNOWBOUND AGAIN.

Harbor Beach and Almont Are Shut In By Drifts.

Harbor Beach, Mich., Feb. 18.—This town is snowbound again and experiencing its second coal famine of the winter. No trains have passed out since last Saturday and there is little prospect of any for at least two or three days more. The macaroni factory, two starch factories and a flour mill have been forced again to close down for lack of fuel.

The temperature has been very low, but no suffering is reported.

Almont, Mich. Feb. 18.—This place is still shut off from the world as no trains have as yet been able to reach here. All other points on the Pere Marquette have had better luck, though trains at nearby towns are from time to time late.

Many Divorced in Van Euren.

Van Euren, Mich., Feb. 18.—The statistical return of divorces in Van Euren county just completed shows that at the beginning of 1903 there were 114 cases pending in new cases were instituted during the year, and 27 decrees were granted. Two of the were suspended, leaving on Dec. 31, 1903, 128 cases pending. Forty decrees were granted to wives and 11 to husbands.

Fifty-Two Below Zero.

Negaunee, Mich. Feb. 18.—The coldest weather in 15 years was experienced in this country Wednesday, the thermometer registering 53 degrees below zero in Negaunee and 52 at the gauge. The continued cold is causing suffering among the poorer classes. Surface work at the mines and lumber work are impossible.

Makes Fortune in Timber Lands.

Port Huron, Mich. Feb. 18.—Jacob T. Hayes, a wealthy resident of this city, has just pulled off a deal which makes him, in all probability, the richest man in Port Huron. He has sold timber lands in the southern states principally in Louisiana, for \$2,200,000. It is said he originally purchased this property for \$30,000.

A Unique Association.

Hillsdale, Mich. Feb. 18.—The rural letter carriers of Hillsdale county have organized a "Mutual Horse Benefit association." When a horse used by one of the members of the association dies or becomes permanently disabled for their business, the association will pay a "horse benefit" of not to exceed \$50 to help the loser to buy another horse.

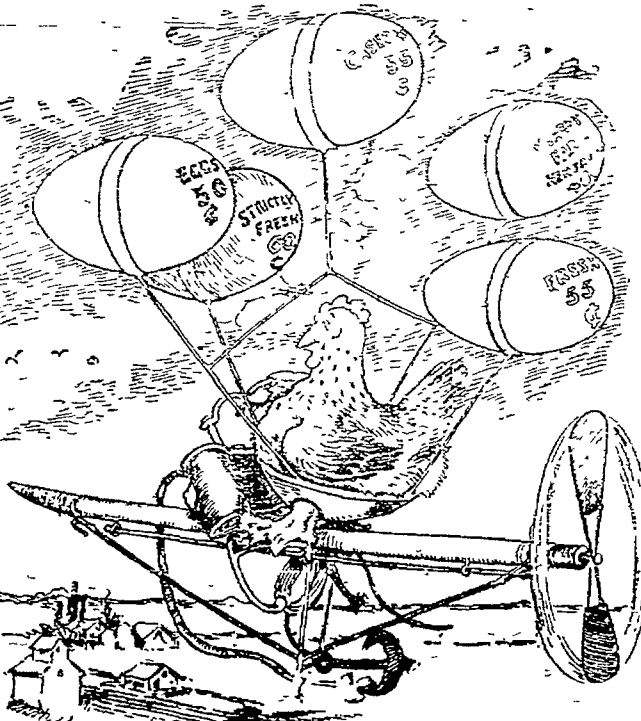

BREATHES HIS LAST

HON. M. A. HANNA DIES OF TYPHOID FEVER. FUNERAL WILL BE HELD IN U. S. SENATE CHAMBER.

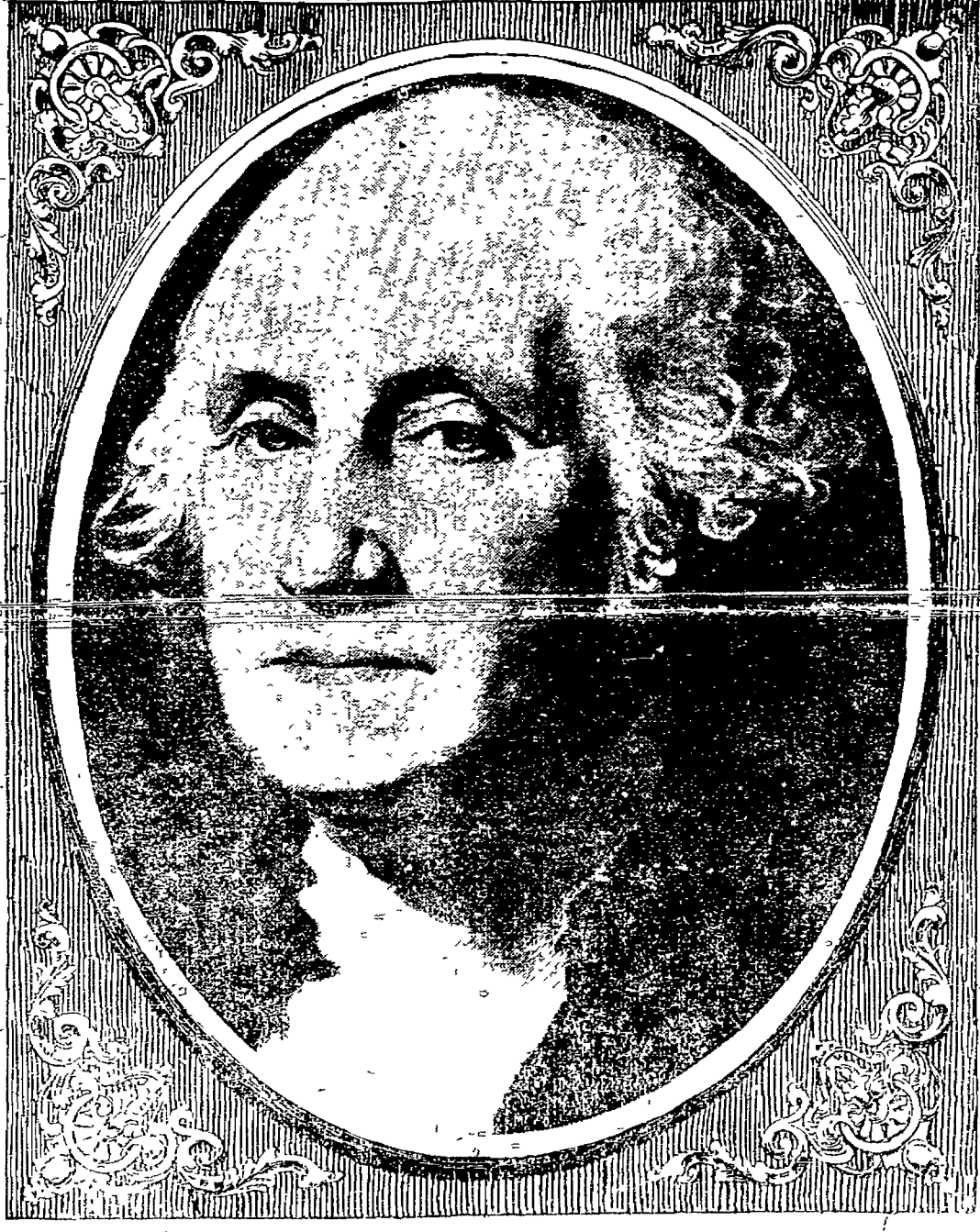
CONGRESS ADJOURNS AND FLAGS AT HALF MAST.

Washington, Feb. 16.—Senator Marcus Hanna died at 6:40 o'clock Monday evening at the family apartments in the Arlington hotel, after an illness extending over nearly two months, filled with apparent recoveries, followed by relapses and finally drifting into typhoid fever, which in his weakened condition he was unable to withstand. When the end came all the members of the senator's family

gathered around the bed. Mrs. Hanna had left the room on a few minutes before. The last sinking spell began at exactly 6:30 o'clock. Drs. Carter and Osier were then in attendance. Mrs. McCormick, one of the senator's daughters and Miss Phelps were present when the end came. Mr. and Mrs. Dan Hanna were the first to arrive and they withdrew immediately to the chamber of the senator's wife, whither

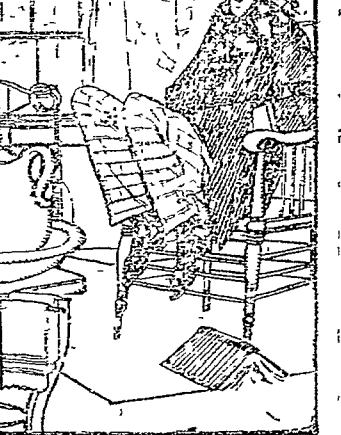

Stuart's Portraits Of Washington

The "Stuart head" of Washington in the Boston Athenaeum is regarded as the standard portrait of the great patriot.

From it nearly a hundred copies were made by Gilbert Stuart himself, while innumerable replicas of it, some of which pass now as Stuaris, have been painted by lesser artists.

It is also the source of the most popular engravings of Washington and has been officially indorsed by the United States government, which uses it on the two-cent stamp.

This portrait was Stuart's third attempt to reproduce the features of his illustrious patriot. The first portrait was painted in 1797.

Stuart was so dissatisfied with it that he ultimately destroyed it, though it was considered by others as excellent likeness that Lord Lansdowne commissioned Stuart to paint into a full length portrait of Washington which he took to England.

Shortly after this Washington himself asked Stuart to paint his portrait as well as that of Mrs. Washington.

Stuart, driven by the press of visitors from his home in Philadelphia to a country retreat in Germantown, transformed his barn into a painting room and it was there that Washington sat for the so-called Athenaeum portrait.

Stuart, with Washington's consent, retained the original of this picture, and the Martha Washington head, making copies for Mount Vernon, the whereabouts of which are not now known.

It was in 1794 that Mr. Stuart first met General Washington, and from that time he devoted his brush almost entirely to his illustrious patron.

The number of portraits of Washington which he made is not known. He left a list of thirty-nine portraits which he had been commissioned to paint for admirers of the president at home and abroad, but he also painted five full length Washingtons and twenty others of different sizes the proceeds of the sale of which he invested in an estate in Pennsylvania.

The originals of Washington and Mrs. Washington were sold after the artist's death to an association of gentlemen, who presented them to the Boston Athenaeum in 1833. They paid Stuart's widow \$1,500 for them.

Gilbert Charles Stuart, the most eminent of America's portrait painters and the rival of the greatest English artists of his day, was born in Narragansett, R. I., in 1756, and died in Boston in 1828.

He received his first instruction from a Scotch artist named Alexander, who took him to Edinburgh when he was about eighteen. He subsequently studied under Benjamin West, in whose family he lived for some time.

In 1814 he set up as a portrait painter in London and achieved immediate fame. He returned to America in 1793.
