PIERCE BATTLE RAGES ALL DAY

Japanese Check the Forward Movement of Russians, Both Losing Heavily.

ARTILLERY DUEL IS DESPERATE

Heavy Rain of Shells Sweeps the Positions Held by Kourapatkin's Forces and Compels a Retreat Amid Fearful Slaughter.

Mukden, Oct. 11.—All day Tuesday a bloody but incessant battle has been raging six miles north of Yental railroad station. Hundreds of men wounded in the fighting are arriving here. Preparations have been made to care for thousands.

Before the "swift" advance of the Russian army the Japanese on Sunday fell back along their entire front. The Russian advance guards crossed the Schili river—about half way between Mukden and Lao Yang—after desultory fighting.

Driving the Japanese' outposts before them, the advance guards of Kourapatkin's army penetrated to a point within three miles of Yental. Here, Monday, the Russian army received the first check to its advance.

Fighting is Continuous. The fighting lasted the entire day and night. It developed from a terrific infantry duel at close range, maintained for several hours into an infantry engagement of the most sanguinary nature.

Under an artillery fire seldom equaled in precision and steadiness, the Russians fell back upon the Schili river, crossing near the railroad, seven miles north of Yental.

The battle was a desperate one, and the Japanese stubbornly defended their positions, and, after several hours of the most furious fighting, assumed the offensive pushing forward to attack.

They expressed the intention of going on. Then they decided to go back. The air quickly and get back home.

THREE HUNDRED DROWN. Japanese Gunboat Struck a Submerged Mine and Goes Down.

Tokio, Oct. 12.—While running under full steam, for shelter from a terrible storm in Pigeon Bay the Japanese gunboat He Yen struck a submerged mine and went down with her entire crew of almost 300 men.

The survivors, two petty officers and two sailors swam to the beach of Chaoopa Island, where they were found two days afterward.

The disaster occurred on the night of Sept. 18. The following official announcement of the disaster was made here: It is highly regrettable that no report in any form has been received of the fate of the other survivors. The sad event was made worse on account of the weather, which must have added greatly to the awful result caused by the explosion of the mine.

Boat Was a Trophy. The He Yen was one of the vessels captured from the Chinese at Wei Hai Wei in the war between China and Japan. The He Yen was converted into an armed gunboat and carried a crew of 300 men.

The gunboat was engaged on guard duty in the vicinity of Pigeon Bay. According to the story told by the survivors, at dusk on the evening of Sept. 18, a terrific storm arose accompanied by high seas.

Ship's Boats Are Swamped.

Suddenly one of the floating mines exploded under the starboard side of the He Yen. The vessel immediately filled and began to sink.

An attempt was made to lower the boats but all were swamped as they were lowered in the heavy seas. The crew then jumped into the sea and attempted to swim to land. They were beaten back by the heavy combers and quickly drowned.

For several days after the disaster other vessels of the Japanese fleet patrolled the coast on the look-out for survivors but failed to find any but the four men first picked up.

Scoless Captures Guns.
