CELEBRATES ITS 75th ANNIVERSARY

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH SOCIETY
DOES IT SUNDAY.

One of Six Oldest in the Great State
of Michigan.

The Presbyterian church of Northville will celebrate the 75th anniversary of its organization on Sunday next. It was organized on Nov. 25, 1829, by Rev. Lmie Prince, at the house of Joseph Yerkes, which stood on the farm now occupied by Mr. Pangel. It was a branch of the Farmington church, now extinct, which was organized in 1825.

The original members were Joseph Yerkes, Erastus Ingersoll, James Purdy, Hiram S. Fuller, John Yerkes, Elizabeth Purdy, Caroline Prince and Mary Yerkes. The first elders were James Purdy and Hiram S. Fuller. At the first meeting Henry Bartow and wife were received by letter, and he was at once elected an elder and made clerk of the session. The first society meeting was held on February 5, 1835, in the Stone school house.

on Atwater street, recently torn down. The first trustees elected were W. Bartow, H. S. Fuller, H. S. Bradley, Wm. Yerkes and Wm. Dunlap.

For several years the church met in private houses, barns and school houses. The first church building was erected in 1846 on the present site, the ground having been given by D. L. Cade. In 1847 the present building was erected and it was reconstructed and rededicated in 1877.

The parsonage lot was given by Elder Wm. Hay who died in 1850, and the present parsonage was built in 1854.

During these 75 years the church has had twenty pastors, the longest term of service being that of Rev. James Dubmar who was twice pastor, for twenty years in all.

The oldest members living are Mrs. Ovenshire and Mrs. J. D. Yerkes, who united with the church in 1839.

The church is now the sixth oldest Presbyterian church in Michigan. The only older churches are Detroit First, Monro, Pontiac, Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti.


