PRESBYTERIAN ANNIVERSARY

SUCCESSFUL SERVICES LARGELY
ATTENDED SUNDAY.

All the Meetings Were Extremely
Interesting.

The celebration of the 75th birthday of the Northville Presbyterian church proved a signal success in point of attendance as well as interest and great credit is due the pastor and his assistants for giving the people of the church and congregation, as well as many others, such an enjoyable commemoration of so important a period in the religious history of our village.

At the morning service a large audience listened to a historical address by Pastor Jerome, who gave an outline of the life of the church during its three score and fifteen years, deducing therefrom many impressive lessons for the consideration of his hearers.

In the afternoon the building was filled with appreciative listeners to an exceptionally fine sermon by Rev. W. T. Jacques, a former popular pastor, who spoke from the text asking the peculiarly fitting question "How old art Thou?"

In the evening the church was again crowded to the doors, the congregations of both the other churches having been invited to join in a union meeting. Addresses and papers relating to the history of the organization were given. Mrs. Wm. Plankerton, Mrs. J. O. Knapp, Mrs. W. S. Jerome and H. M. White contributed very interestingly to this part of the program. Miss Jennie Dean gave an instructive talk on her work as a missionary in Persia and Mrs. Jerome read a clever original poem in which was ingeniously woven the names of many of the present members of the church. Letters were read by Mr. Jerome from Rev. A. J. Buel, a former pastor, now in California; Miss Sarah Cochran, whose father once preached here, and from D. M. Ladd of Milford, now 91 years old, who was a member of the church many years ago. Mr. Ladd's communication deserves special mention, being a gem of wit, humor and excellence of diction which any person a third of that age might be proud to have written. Pastors Dimmock and Stephens of the Baptist and Methodist churches made appropriate congratulatory remarks, pointed with pertinent words of appeal and exhortation suggested by the occasion. Many affectionate tributes were paid to those who founded the organization amid the hardships and drawbacks of pioneer life and also to the memory of Rev. Mr. Dubuque, who was lovingly identified with the life of the church and its members for nearly a generation.

The excellent special music furnished by the choir, which included a violin solo by Mrs. L. A. Merritt in the morning and a vocal solo by Miss Lucile Calkins in the afternoon, added greatly to the interest of all the services.

A YOUNG BOY ACCIDENTALLY SHOT

SUNDAY HUNTING FATALITY
NEAR FARMINGTON.

Twelve Year Old Albert Maybee
Was the Victim

The body of Albert Maybee, a 12 year old boy, was found about 11 o'clock Sunday night lying across a log at the edge of the River Rouge, a bullet wound on his forehead and his hands and one foot frozen into the stream.

The boy, who was adopted from the Coldwater state school by John B. Dilling, was sleeping temporarily at the home of Joseph Graham in Southfield township. He started out Sunday with a .32 caliber rifle to hunt, and he had not returned at 9 o'clock. Inquiry was made at the home of Dilling. When it was learned that he was not there search was made and he was tracked to the spot where the body was found.

Apparently he was crossing the stream on a log and when nearly over the trigger caught on a limb and the weapon was discharged. The bullet struck a glancing blow on the head, but fractured his skull and doubtless caused instant death. The body was taken to the Graham home and Dr. Holcomb and Justice of Peace John Thayer were called to hold an inquest.

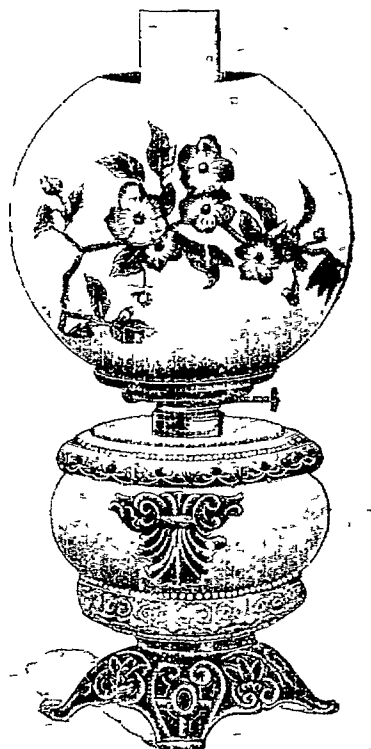
